



e Dean Dear Parishioners and Friends

November is often referred to as 'the month of remembrance'. There is All Saints' Day (1st November) when we remember our nearest and dearest who are now in God's nearer presence.

There is Remembrance Sunday (10th November) when we remember, with gratitude, those who served in two World Wars and in subsequent conflicts, and those who serve their Queen and Country today in distant parts of the world.

In our own personal lives we pause to recall those whom we knew and loved — those 'who once were comrades of our way'. It is, perhaps, a member of our family; a friend from school; a colleague from work; a member of our church or community — someone who walked with us and shared some of life's experiences with us — that we most remember. This month — as I'm certain we all do at many times during the year — we pause and say "I thank my God every time I remember you". (Philippians 1: 3).

What is it about them that we remember most of all?

Is it what they said?. We would have to have a very good memory if we were to recall every word that someone said to us during a lifetime! We may recall some of the conversations that we shared with our friends – but not all of them.

Is it what they did that we remember most of all?. The answer is "Yes!".

It is a fact that when our words are long forgotten our actions will still be remembered. The kind and helpful action that was done when we were sick or in trouble. The gentle embrace or handshake at a time of loss that conveyed the message, "I care". These are some of the things that we remember about our good friends. It is not always what they said that made the greatest impact on our lives. It is what they did – and the way that they did it – that meant so much to us at the time and that has continued to make a positive impression upon us.

That was the legacy that they left us. What legacy are you and I going to leave behind us? When the day comes that you and I have to leave this place and time, what are the memories that our family and friends will have of us? What words will they recall? What actions made the greatest impact on their lives? As we spend whatever time is left to us here on earth, let us do so in such a way that in time to come our family and friends can remember us and say with complete honesty, "I thank my God every time I remember you".

I expect to pass through this world but once, and any good thing, therefore, that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow-creature, let me do it now, let me not defer, nor neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again.

As you know Bishop Andrew Forster will be enthroned in Saint Columb's Cathedral on Sunday 5 January 2020 at 4pm and we want to put our best foot forward. Before that we have a very special choir from Dublin making their

third visit, the A.B.O.D. service on the first Saturday in December, visiting choirs and events followed by the Nine Lessons and Carols- the real start of Christmas – a very busy time! We need to have a plan if it is all going to get sorted and it will need a team of workers to make it all happen. It is such a large building that the dedicated people who clean the Cathedral on a weekly basis, and have their rota of duties, do not have the time to do all those extra jobs that needs undertaken when guests are expected.

WASHING A 231 YEARS OLD

TABLE CLOTH



A Londonderry lady who must be a very careful washer is Mrs. Elizabeth Fielding, a member of the Mothers' Union of St. Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry, who recently had the task of washing an Irish linen table-cloth which was once owned by the Earl of Bristol, the eccentric Bishop of Derry (1730-1803).

"The Dean of Derry, Very Rev. George Good asked me if I would wash it and I decided that I would try — but I must admit that I was a bit nervous at first!

TURNED OUT WELL

It certainly turned out very well, and I find it hard to believe that it is, in fact, so old," added Mrs. Fielding.

The cloth was, in fact, owned by Canon Young of Dungiven Parish Church, who had obtained it from friends who had bought a job lot of tablecloths at an auction — only to discover later that this valuable cloth was amongst them and they gave it to Canon Young who, upon his retirement some years ago, donated it to St. Columb's Cathedral, where it is kept in the valt for safe keeping," explained Mrs. Fielding.

15 coins stolen

Deep disappointment that thieves attacked St. Columb's Cathedral, in Londonderry, was expressed by the Dean of Derry, Very Rev. George Good, after the theft of 15 coins from a glass - fronted display case in the Cathedral's Chapter House.

The coins were from the reigns of Elizabeth I, James II, William III and George III and included three pieces of gun-money — coins cast from melted down guns and used by James II to pay his troops during his Irish Campaign.

LOCK FORCED

The lock on the display case was forced open by the intruders who took: Elizabeth I sixpenny piece, 1567; James II half crown, 1690 and Irish half-penny, 1686; William and Mary half-penny, 1694; William III shilling, florin and half-crown, 1697; George III, 1782.

Also taken were 30-pence pieces of brass

A spokesman at police head quarters in Londonderry on Wednesday appealed for the return of the coins, which, he said, were of very little financial value "but were of considerable historical interest."

DISTURBING

The spokesman appealed to any person who had information about the stolen coins to make an immediate con-

tact with the police and said: "Because of their historical interest it is very important that they should be recovered."

Commenting on the thefts, Dean Good said it was "most disturbing" that the Cathedral should be made the target of robbers.

"It is particularly regrettable that, at a time, when more and more people are visiting the Cathedral this should happen," he continued.

MORE VISITORS

Dean Good said that until about 1967 between 100 and 150 tourists visited the Cathedral daily during the summer season but, while disturbances, the number had substantially declined.

"During the present summer there has been an upward tendency and we have had between 100 and 150 people calling weekly at the Cathedral to see the building and its historic relics," added the Dean.

Christmas Tree Bauble




The cycle of services continued in October with the Choristers and Gentlemen of the Cathedral Choir being as busy as ever.





Obituary

Ronald (Ron) Dobson 2nd August 1928 – 18th October 2019

The introduction to this service tells us why we are here. We have come here today to remember Ron Dobson, to give thanks for his life, and to support his family in their time of sadness. Let me say to you Etta and to your family – Rosaleen, Joanie and Galvin, to your spouses Charlie, Gary and Gillian, to the 9 grandchildren and to the 21 great grandchildren – the members of the Cathedral family offer to all of you our deepest and sincerest sympathy at this time. We uphold you in our thoughts and prayers and come alongside you in this time of sadness.

Ronald Dobson was born 91 years ago – on 2nd August 1928 – at Gateshead, Northumberland. He was the only child of Matthew and Catherine Dobson.

Ron never knew his mother because she died in childbirth. His father re-married and Ron became the older brother to Rosaleen, Margaret and Matthew.

Matty is still alive and lives in Sydney, Australia.



Ron's early years were spent in Stocksfield, just outside of Newcastle. His first employment was as a leading Stoker with the Royal Navy. Here he had the opportunity to learn a trade, but also to see the world. Trips to countries in the Mediterranean and to other places overseas were frequent. On one occasion he came to Northern Ireland and found himself in Londonderry. He fell in love with the City and with one of its citizens – Etta McElwee – who was to become his wife.

Ron and Etta were married here in Saint Columb's Cathedral almost 67 years ago — on 27th December 1952. The Service was conducted by The Reverend Gerry Carson. The bestman was John Jordan. The bride's maid was Elizabeth Chapman. And according to Etta, it was a very cold day. Following their marriage Ron and Etta lived for a short time at No. 5, Albert Street in the Fountain with Etta's parents Archie and Ruby, her sister Kathleen Wright and her 4 children. They later moved to live in the Glen Estate in the late 1950's. During this time they were blessed with three children — Rosaleen, Joanie and Galvin. Ron was working at Dunlop's Factory in Pennyburn as a loom mechanic and he later became a production manager with the company.

Times were not easy in those days, but the Dobson family was happy and contented.

In the early 1970's they moved to England for a few years but the ties to Londonderry were strong and they returned to set up their home at Seymour Gardens in Nelson Drive. Ron found employment at Clarke's Textile Factory in Upperlands, near Maghera. It, probably, was the only time that he and Etta were separated in 66 years, because Ron lodged in Upperlands during the week and returned home at the weekend. It seems that he missed Etta and his family because he left Clarke's Factory, returned to the City, and found employment with the Post Office.

As a young man Ron had served in the Royal Navy and the travel bug never left him. He and Etta, their children and their children's spouses spent many wonderful holidays at home and abroad.

Ron was a family man and he liked nothing better than to spend time with his family. This was possible when every year he rented a holiday home in Portrush when all of his family could come together and when Ron had time to engage with his grandchildren, enjoying the wee concerts that they held for him.

Granda Ron was a favourite person because of the lovely treats that he gave to his grandchildren. Sliced apples coated with sugar, and ice cream drinks, became favourite treats and even earned the name 'Something different'.

Ron's love later extended to his great grandchildren and a visit to Summer Meadows Court never ended without a coin or a note being slipped into their hand.

Ron had a passion for football and he enjoyed watching the ups and downs of his favourite football teams – Newcastle United and Berwich Rangers. Irish music and Irish Dance were also favourite pastimes – and ones that he passed on to Rosaleen and Joanie when they were younger.

Did you know that Ron was a piper? – he played the Highland bagpipes with Kildoag and Molenan pipe bands, and passed on this interest to his son Galvin who now plays those same pipes with Bready Ulster Scots.

Some time ago, when Ron was making preparations for his funeral, he chose the hymns that we are singing today. He also wished the pipes to be played. He made his own choice of tunes and these will be played at Ballyoan Cemetery later today.

Ron and Etta were loyal and supportive members of Saint Columb's Cathedral, attending worship here Sunday by Sunday unless prevented by illness. One of Ron's duties on a Sunday morning was to chauffeur Etta and her sister Ruby Jordan to church. Being a diligent and obedient husband and brother-in-law, he refrained from speaking or making a comment and allowed the two ladies to chat away until they arrived at the Cathedral.

Although Ron was 91 years young, he kept up to date with modern technology. The social media was a way for him to interact with his family and friends who always looked forward to his many posts and selfies. I often found a 'like' or a comment from him on the Cathedral Facebook page in response to a notice about some event in the Cathedral.

Over the past while Ron has not been very well, but he remained positive – never wishing to upset Etta or his family. For the past few weeks he was a patient at Altnagelvin Hospital and I know that his family would want me to record their deepest thanks to the team of dedicated doctors and nursing staff who cared for him.

It always was a pleasure to minister to him at home or in hospital, but due to another engagement I was unable to be with him and his family on Friday evening. I wish to record my thanks to The Reverend Robert Boyd of Glendermott Parish who ministered to Ron's family at that sad and difficult time on Friday. Ron's family also wishes to record its thanks to Adair and Neely, Funeral Directors, the clergy, staff and parishioners of Saint Columb's Cathedral and to all family, friends and neighbours who have been so kind and supportive at this difficult time.

Ron and Etta were married for almost 67 years. During those years they have experienced many trials and disappointments – as well as many happy occasions. I have been privileged to have shared with them over the past years in the celebration of the marriage of a grand-daughter and in a number of baptisms of great grandchildren – as well as celebrating the lives of family members whose journey here on earth had ended.

On those occasions when I had the privilege of ministering to Ron and Etta in their home at Summer Meadows Court I became aware of the strong relationship that many years of marriage had held together. I could sense — in the words of a prayer - that each was to the other 'a strength in need, a counsellor in perplexity, a comfort in sorrow, and a companion in joy'.

Today is a sad day for you Etta and for your family and I know that you will miss Ron very much. I hope that, even in the dark moments of these days, you will find it possible to echo the words of Saint Paul as you think of Ron: I thank my God every time I remember you.

Following the service Ron was buried at Ballyoan Cemetery, Londonderry.
