The Dean Dear Parishioners and Friends

This month the theme of my Letter is Harvest. I, however, wish to travel down a related path and to

consider with you our responsibility to God's Creation.
I want to do this by using the text of my Sermon on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> July 2021.

The earth is the Lord's and all that fills it, the compass of the world and all who dwell therein. (Psalm 24: 1).

We have lived through almost 16 months of the Coronavirus pandemic. We have coped with lockdowns, with restrictions to the way we could live our lives – who we could see, the places we could visit.

We have become accustomed to hand sanitisers, to wearing face coverings and to observing social distancing.

None of this has been easy – and we have grumbled and complained. But we might consider ourselves to be among the fortunate ones. We are here to tell the tale. We have survived the physical and emotional ups and downs.

We recognise that many – some of whom we knew and loved – were not as fortunate.

They succumbed to the pandemic and did not live to fight another day.

It is only reasonable to acknowledge that the past 16 months have filled us with many kinds of emotions; fear, sadness, anger being some of them. We may all have voiced our concerns and criticised whoever for whatever path we were asked to travel – and perhaps we have been unable to see anything that is positive about COVID-19.

Yet, there have been some voices that have been positive in their reactions and responses to this pandemic. I have read comments such as, 'The pandemic forced me to slow down the pace of my life. I had to work from home and I had more time for my family'.

Reflecting on the past 16 months we can all acknowledge that some of us who have had to work from home have saved money. There has been less travelling to work or schools. Lockdown meant that we could not take the odd week-end break away from home, or the occasional outing to the local restaurant.

We were encouraged to spend time in the garden or to walk in a local park. And as people did so they discovered something uplifting. They noticed 'the sound of silence'.

There were fewer cars and lorries on the road. The air smelt purer – free from pollution.

They were able to hear clearly 'the dawn chorus' – the sounds of the birds.

They were able to see the flowers and shrubs in their full beauty. In short, God has touched our eyes and we have been able to acknowledge that He is the Creator of all things, both great and small.

When the Coronavirus is well and truly over I wonder will our eyes still be open to the beauty of God's world? Will our pace of life be that bit slower to allow us to enjoy the created order of His world? Or will we be numbered amongst those who, for whatever reason, wish to abuse and destroy what God has designed?

In the Story of Creation, as told in the Book Genesis, as each phase of creation ended God

looked at it and declared that it was very good. We read that on the sixth day God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness, and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth'. (Genesis 1: 26).

God was appointing humankind to be a steward of His creation, to care for everything that

He had made.

The psalmist wrote, The earth is the Lord's – not that the earth is mine and yours to do with it what we desire.

God in his love for us lent us this planet are words that we will hear later in this service. A reminder to us that our role on this earth is that of a caretaker. The task given to us by God from the beginning of time has been to care for everything that He has made.

How well have we fulfilled this role? On reflection, we have to confess – Not very well.

When we hear of human beings being murdered we raise our voices in opposition.

We protest when children and vulnerable adults receive less care than they should.

We have in place rules and guidance to help us protect people.

But when we hear of parts of God's world being destroyed, or of beautiful animals being killed for personal enjoyment, we remain silent.

There are few protests. And yet we number ourselves amongst those who are good stewards of God's creation. Isn't there something wrong here? How can we stand by and do nothing when so much of God's beautiful creation is fast becoming just a distant memory? We all know the maxim, 'Actions speak louder than words'.

In preparing this sermon I have been conscious that I have pointed a finger at myself and others who have not been good stewards of God's creation. I have asked myself the question, 'Is there something more that I should be doing, and is there a particular path that I should be encouraging my parishioners to follow?'.

On Friday morning a possible answer arrived! It came from the good old Church of Ireland and in particular from The Church and Society Commission.

All of the clergy of The Church of Ireland received information about a new 3 ½ minute video encouraging parishes to support Climate Sunday that will be observed on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> September. Climate Sunday is an initiative of Churches Together in Britain and

Ireland.

Archbishop John McDowell, the Archbishop of Armagh, commends Climate Sunday by saying, "There has probably never been a time when an emphasis by the Churches on the care of the created order is needed. Climate Sunday gives parishes the opportunity to celebrate God's work in creation as well as his work in redemption, at a time when the need to do so is most pressing".

Canon Andrew Orr, the Rector of The Parish of Youghal in County Cork, is a member of The Church and Society Commission and also Chair of Eco-Congregation Ireland, an inter-church organisation seeking to help churches to celebrate the gift of God's creation, recognise the interdependence of all creation, and care for it in their life and mission and through members' personal lifestyles.

He says, "Climate Sunday is a fantastic initiative which is already proving very popular. It is a very straightforward way for churches to highlight the issue of climate justice in their

congregations and get involved in caring for God's creation".

This information arriving on my doorstep just when I was reflecting on the words of the Psalmist — The earth is the Lord's and all that fills it — was not only timely but I believe was also God directed and inspired. It is an answer from God as to how you and I might engage more positively in caring for His world.

Since I wrote and preached this Sermon things have moved on. Words have been translated into actions.

The Select Vestry has given permission for a group of parishioners to identify a small area of the churchyard that could be developed as a Wild Garden. This would be a place where wild flowers (sown from seeds) could attract insects and birds.

It is hoped that within the next few days such an area can be identified and before too long The Cathedral Wild Garden will become a reality.



#### **GUIDANCE ON FACE COVERINGS IN CHURCHES**

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

Please find attached the latest advice in relation to the wearing of face coverings in church buildings in Northern Ireland, which has been issued by the Archbishop of Armagh and which I hope will prove helpful.

The change to the regulations came into effect at 6 pm yesterday, Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> July, 2021.

Please note that the relaxation applies to **acts of worship only**. Face coverings must still be worn when entering or exiting places of worship, and it is strongly advised that they be worn during singing and while moving around our premises. This updated guidance follows discussions with the Executive Office at Stormont and has been 'worked through' with the other main Churches.

#### **FACE COVERINGS AND CHURCH SERVICES**

Much has been reported in the press in the last twenty-four hours about the decision by the Northern Ireland Executive to remove the mandatory requirement for face coverings to be worn during religious services in places of worship. Please be aware that although the former regulations are now being moved to guidance only, face coverings will still be legally required when entering and exiting the building.

It is also strongly advised that they are worn whilst singing or moving around inside the church premises.

This new guidance only applies to acts of worship.

The clear guidance from the Chief Medical Officer and Chief Scientific Advisor remains that face coverings should continue to be worn, therefore parishioners are strongly encouraged to continue wearing face coverings, for the time being, when attending church services as the benefits, particularly in the regard to the welfare of others, outweigh the risks.

Congregational singing also considerably increases the risk of the spread of the virus so wearing a face-covering is a necessary mitigation against that risk. By wearing a face covering we are showing our support and consideration for other members of the congregation, particularly the more vulnerable and those with underlying health concerns.

Individually and collectively, we are also then continuing to play our part in preventing transmission of the virus.

Guidance remains that social distancing of 2 metres is recommended within church services.

The closer we are in proximity to others, then the higher the risk. The risk of transmission is therefore higher at one metre compared to two metres. The highest risk environments for the spread of the virus are indoor, crowded, poor ventilated spaces where people are in close proximity to others for a period of time.

Please continue to ensure that all necessary mitigations and safety measures are in place and that risk assessments are regularly updated.


## **Sunday Service**

If you or a relative is admitted to, or discharged from, hospitals or nursing homes please let Dean Raymond Stewart or The Reverend Canon John Merrick know if you would like a Pastoral Visit.

Under Data Protection (GDPR) we <u>do not</u> have access to the Hospital Admission Forms, so we can only know that you are a patient in a hospital or a nursing home if the Chaplain notifies us or if you or a relative notifies us.

Thank you for your co-operation.

#### As of Monday 24th May 2021

N.B. It is now possible for clergy to visit in care homes and hospitals, in addition to visits from family members. All local restrictions and procedures should be followed, including, in most cases, advance appointments for care homes.

Bishop Andrew Forster has advised the members of the ordained clergy:

I recommend that you contact hospitals and care homes in advance of visiting to confirm local arrangements. A conversation with the family of a patient in advance of a visit may also be worthwhile to alleviate any concerns on either side.

#### **Update on St Columb's School of Music:**

Demand for student places in St Columb's School of Music since it opened two years ago has led to a fundraising campaign to provide additional accommodation.

Despite the pandemic, we have been able to go from strength to strength, and the School of Music is now home to over 220 (and counting!)

students who study piano, organ, singing, guitar, violin, viola, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, recorder, harp, drums and music theory. We are delighted to report that the eight teaching rooms in our premises at Cathedral House, No. 1 Saint Columb's Court are now fully utilised Monday-Thursday, and, as numbers continue to rise, this leaves us with a very healthy problem - a substantial waiting list.

In a bid to provide additional rooms - and additional tutors, many of whom are research students in the Faculty of Music in The Ulster University, Magee Campus - we are seeking to raise £10,000 to renovate an adjoining flat, situated to the rear of our current premises, which once served as the residence for the caretaker of 'No.1' when it was the home of The Honourable The Irish Society. The flat, which has been vacant for many years, requires major work, but, when finished, will create a further five teaching rooms, thus providing a considerable expansion of the music school. To date, we have been fortunate in raising £7,000 of the total amount.

St Columb's of Music would like to thank those all who have kindly made donations to this initiative, especially The Reverend Canon David Crooks, Margaret O'Hara, Henry Cox & Michael Kunkel, Ken & Joan Doherty, and Sir Denis Desmond. We appreciate all the support and encouragement we have received from the local community, and beyond, since we first opened our doors in September 2019.

#### Elvin George Alexander Love 11<sup>th</sup> September 1948 – 26<sup>th</sup> August 2021

The introduction to the Funeral Service gives us clear instructions as to why we are here and what we should do. It focuses the mind of the preacher so that he does not wander too far from his brief.

It gives us a number of markers upon which we can base our thoughts.

The introduction tells us that we are to remember our brother or sister who has died; to give thanks for his or her life; and to support by word and deed those who are bereaved.

It also focuses our minds on the reality of hope in a time of sadness and loss and reminds us that for those who have put their faith and trust in Jesus Christ death is not the end of life. It is, instead, the beginning of a new relationship with Him in Heaven.

These are the signposts that will, hopefully, guide our thinking today as we speak lovingly and, I hope, honestly about our dear friend Elvin Love.

Let me begin by expressing to you – Elvin's family and relatives – my sympathy, the sympathy of Canon John Merrick and the sympathy of the family that is Saint Columb's Cathedral.

We think particularly today of Elvin's son Richard and daughter Rachel in Australia.

Of his daughter-in-law Lynn and son-in-law Bill. Of his grandchildren Calum, Lexie and Aurora. I hope that you are able, through the technology of live streaming, to feel very much a part of this service today.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to you from all of us in this Cathedral Church of Saint Columb.

I also wish to express our sympathy to Elvin's brother John, sister-in-law Ingrid and to your family, Jonathan, Lydia and Christopher. And to Elvin's cousin Hilary.

Our thoughts and prayers are with you now and we hope will continue in the days, weeks and months to come.

**Elvin George Alexander Love** was the older son on John Chambers Love and Eveline Mary Elizabeth Love. He was born at 14 Melrose Terrace in the Waterside on 11<sup>th</sup> September 1948 and baptised in this Cathedral on 31<sup>st</sup> October 1948 by Dean Leslie Lawrenson.

From an early age Saint Columb's Cathedral played a pivotal role in the life of Elvin and later in the life of his younger brother John.

Their mother Molly taught at the Cathedral Primary School for many years and their father Jack was the Sunday School Superintendent for 33 years.

Elvin attended the Cathedral Primary School where he received a good secular education, enabling him to progress to Foyle College and then to Queen's University in Belfast where he graduated with a degree in Zoology. He subsequently completed a Master's Degree at The University of Ulster.

Elvin found employment in the teaching profession at the North West Regional College here in Londonderry – an establishment better known perhaps as 'The Tech' – where he taught for almost 40 years.

As I have mentioned Saint Columb's Cathedral was never far from Elvin's interests and we believe that around the year 1956 – as a young boy of 8 years – he joined the junior ranks of the Boy Choristers in this Cathedral.

Work commitments and other interests led Elvin away from the Choir for a number of years but he returned as a Gentleman of the Choir some 20 years ago.

How appropriate it is that some of his close friends and choir colleagues are here today to lead the singing at his Funeral Service.

Elvin would, I believe, be so pleased and especially that one of his favourite pieces of music – **O Thou the Central Orb** by Charles Wesley – should be sung as the Anthem.

Time does not allow us to sing one of Elvin's favourite hymns – Dear Lord and Father of mankind – but many will continue to smile – as Elvin often did – as they sing the words:

The silence of eternity, interpreted by love!

Many lovely tributes have been written on the Cathedral Facebook Page drawing attention to Elvin's unique character; to his guick wit and dry sense of humour; to his store of stories;



and to the encouragement and advice that he willingly shared with the younger Choristers. Other Facebook pages have highlighted Elvin, the sportsman. His particular interests were rugby and golf.

In his younger days he had been the Captain of various Rugby teams and he had been a

popular member of City of Derry Rugby Club.

He, also, was an active member of City of Derry Golf Club, having been Captain in 1999 as the photograph on the cover of the Order of Service shows.

When I came to this Parish as Rector and Dean in 2017 Elvin was unwell and I called to see him

at his home at Dunnwood Park on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> May.

In our conversation Elvin talked about his love of golf and disclosed how he would pop out through a hole in the fence to play a round of golf at the Golf Course that adjoins his home. I understand from his brother John that that hole is still there!

In recent years Elvin has been suffering from the debilitating illness – Parkinsons. He was unable to come to church and to sing in the Choir for many months – but there were occasions when he did manage to come to Choral Evensong and participate as best as he could in worship.

In worship Elvin would often have sung about God, about His role as Creator.

And I'm sure that Elvin must have felt a close affinity with God as he contemplated the natural world which he loved and about which he was extremely knowledgeable.

On Monday, Elvin got an infection and was admitted to Althagelvin Hospital.

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic neither myself nor Canon John Merrick were permitted to visit him. I would like to record our thanks and the thanks of Elvin's family to the Hospital Chaplain, Canon David Ferry, who visited Elvin on Tuesday afternoon. He read a passage of Scripture and prayed with Elvin and a relative who was present. That was an important moment because Elvin's life expectancy was short.

At 3.30 a.m. on Thursday morning, Elvin drew his final breath and was gathered into the presence of God. In that moment all of his earthly pains and troubles, trials and tribulations ceased to be and he, finally, was at peace – physically, emotionally and spiritually. His death has left a great void in the life of his family and relatives and of the many people in this City who knew and respected him. And the sadness we feel today is real and tangible. But the good news is that while Elvin is not with us in person, his life continues in a new place – and we believe that one day in God's own time we will meet Elvin again when God reaches out and takes our hand to lead us safely to Him.

The Christian life offers us hope even in the midst of darkness and despair.

We hold on to the promise of Jesus: I will never leave you or forsake you.

And that promise gives us the opportunity to meet a new situation with courage and hope. We can give thanks for the past with all of our memories of Elvin; we can live in the present with the real sadness of earthly separation from the one whom we love; and we can look forward to the future with hope because we are loved by a God who sent His Son to be our Saviour and Redeemer.

May we live by faith, walk in hope and be renewed in love, until the world reflects your glory and you are all in all.

Even so, come, Lord Jesus. Amen.

#### Irene Elizabeth (Renee) Moyse 7th December 1937 - 10th September 2021

We are here today to lay to rest the mortal remains of Irene Elizabeth (Renee) Moyse, remembering with thanksgiving the life and witness of a much-loved wife, mother, mother-in-law, grandmother and sister. This is a sad day for you, Renee's family, and we want you to know that we stand with you as you face the lonely and empty times that lie ahead as you come to terms with the loss that you are experiencing on this day and into the future. Renee was born on 7<sup>th</sup> December 1937, the fourth child born to William and Lena Kitson of Hempton Close in this city of Londonderry. She received her formal education in the Cathedral Primary School and following this she entered the shirt manufacturing industry as an employee of Welch Margetson.


In 1960, while attending a dance in the Memorial Hall, she met her late husband, Alan. He was serving in the Royal Navy and was stationed, at that time, in Derry. It may not have been love at first sight but romance flourished and Alan wrote his letter of proposal to Renee while at sea and they were married by Dean Leslie Lawrenson in Saint Columb's Cathedral on 18<sup>th</sup> August 1962.

Alan left the Royal Navy after twelve years of service and he and Renee settled in London. It has to be said that Renee missed home and family. They returned to Northern Ireland and settled in Antrim where Alan was employed in the Fire Service.

However, ill health meant early retirement for him. On their return to Londonderry they lived in Irish Street and then to 42, Woodburn Park. As I have already said Alan saw service in the Royal Navy. However, Renee also served in the armed forces as a member of the Territorial Army rising to the rank of Lance Corporal and during my visits to her in Woodburn she enjoyed reflecting on those service days.

In their marriage they were blessed with four children Janet, Julie, Bobby and Philip who in turn married Les, Graham, Lisa and Michelle and through these marriage Renee became a proud grandmother to Gary, Jaymee, Bobby, Alfie, Ivy, Ellie, Sam, William, Andrew, Robert, and Adam. Photographs of the grandchildren adorned the walls of the

living room in Woodburn Park. She so enjoyed speaking of their successes and the love she had for each and every one.



Following the death of Alan, Renee found it very difficult to cope. She was devoted to Alan and his passing left a void in her life that could not be filled and as I said at Alan's funeral service Renee would regularly repeat the words 'till death do us part'. Today that separation is over and Renee is now reunited with Alan and with all those whom she loved in this life in the nearer presence of God where there is no more pain, sorrow, beginnings or endings, but one equal joy and happiness in that eternal kingdom.




It was in these places that Rosemary grew to know the love and support of parents and siblings. With her five siblings she enjoyed many an adventure. She particularly liked and enjoyed the annual Sunday School excursion because it took place on a

weekday and this meant a day off school!

She also enjoyed the annual holiday to Portrush every year when she and her family would go on long walks and Rosemary would ask the neighbours for a packet of biscuits to enjoy on the picnics.

Growing up in The Fountain a certain young man – John Holland – caught sight of Rosemary. From Rosemary's perspective it was not love at first sight, but through time love blossomed and the couple were married on 10<sup>th</sup> November 1984 in Saint Columb's Cathedral by Dean Cecil Orr who had just arrived in Saint Columb's.





Rosemary and John set up home together in The Fountain and they were blessed with four children – Alan, Samantha, Aaron and Jason.

As the years passed Rosemary and John became grandparents to eleven boys and girls. On 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2016 John, who had been ill for some time, died in Altnagelvin Hospital and Rosemary felt very much alone.

Then she met Gary and the smile returned to her face.

She and Gary enjoyed many outings together, particularly to Ballintoy Harbour.

Like most ladies, shopping trips featured on Rosemary's 'Must Do' list and she found in Gary a most obliging chauffeur.

Rosemary was employed as a Carer at Meadowbank Care Home where she was well liked and respected. But in April 2020, due to ill health, she had to give up her work.

Rosemary was diagnosed with Cancer and while other people might have felt like giving up on life Rosemary continued to be positive for Gary and her family.

Rosemary and Gary had planned to marry in December of this year but due to her illness they brought the date of their marriage forward.

Their wedding was arranged by the wonderful staff on Ward 26 in Altnagelvin Hospital for last Saturday, 4<sup>th</sup> September.

Life for you without Rosemary is going to be very different, but hold on to a flicker of hope. Believe in your hearts that Rosemary's spirit lives on and although absent from the body she is present with the Lord.

Continue to embrace the promises of God that He will never leave you or forsake you. Find comfort and re-assurance in prayer, Bible reading, attendance at church where the Gospel – the Good News – is heard, expounded and shared and where the Presence of God can be felt in a unique way.

In those moments when the things of this world get you down, remember Rosemary – her love and her life, her laughter and her smile – and be lifted from the ordinary things into the spiritual realm where the love and beauty of God can be experienced in greater glory. Today, may Rosemary rest in peace and be raised in glory.

#### George Dunlop 20<sup>th</sup> July 1937 – 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2021

We have come here today as family members and as friends of George Dunlop to thank God for him; and to remember him – not only as the person whom illness forced him to become; someone who was so dependent on other people for his most basic of needs – but also as the person whom in the early years of life was a pivitol figure on the sportsfield, in the textile

throughout the world. We remember George as the beloved husband of Irene and the loving father of, and the role model to,

industry, and in Freemasonry in this country, north and south, and

his children Alyson, Terence and Joanne.

The much loved father-in-law of Rosalind and Noel and the devoted grandfather of Edward, Elizabeth, Ross, William, Richard, David and Alice – and the loving brother of his surviving siblings: Renee, Billy, Harry and Olive – all of whom and whose families live in America and Canada.

I express to all of you the sympathy of myself, of Canon John Merrick and of the members of the Cathedral family of The Parish of Templemore.

I am grateful to George's family who has shared with me their memories – and I will use some of them in this tribute today.



Let us go back in time – to 20<sup>th</sup> July 1937. That is the day on which George Dunlop and his twin brother Billy were born to George and Edna Dunlop of 26 Violet Street, Londonderry. George was the fifth of eight siblings – his brothers and sisters being Desney, Betty, Renee, Faye, Billy, Harry and Olive.

He was christened at Waterside Presbyterian Church and nurtured in the faith there, becoming an active member of 6<sup>th</sup> Londonderry Boys' Brigade Company and later serving

on the Church Committee and Kirk Session.

George attended Clooney Public Elementary School and later, in 1949, proceeded to Foyle College where he excelled on the sportsfield – representing the School with some distinction

at both rugby and cricket as well as being a member of the boxing club.

Following his education at Foyle College he found employment with the City Accountant's Office in the Londonderry Corporation and he studied accountancy for five years before moving over into the clothing and textile industry where he held a number of senior management positions in Northern Ireland and Scotland before becoming Regional Executive of the Clothing and Footwear Industry Training Board in Northern Ireland in the 1970's. In the 1990's he was appointed Technical Manager of the Garment and Textiles Association at the University of Ulster after which he formed his own company.

There is a saying, "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy".

Well, in the midst of his busy work schedule George Dunlop was in fact able to pursue another interest.

He became romantically involved with a certain Miss Irene May Wilson – a member of The Parish of Templemore who lived at No. 6, Saint Columb's Court.

Irene's father Isaac was the Dean's Verger at the Cathedral (a post that his son – also named Isaac – was later to fill).

George and Irene exchanged their marriage vows here in Saint Columb's Cathedral, watched by Dean Leslie Lawrenson, on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1961. And with this bonding of two persons a bonding with this Cathedral Church was also formed.

After a few transitory house moves George and Irene settled at 26 Ross Bay creating a loving and secure family home for their young children - Alyson, Terence and Joanne.

Sadly tragedy struck in May 1983 with the death of Alyson who for many years had suffered from Stills Disease. It was a devasting loss for George, Irene, Terence and Joanne – a loss that, I suspect, time has never completely healed.

George was at heart a family man and it was a particularly distressing time when he learned that his wife Irene had cancer. He cared for her in the family home with selfless devotion until she died in November 1998 at the relatively young age of 58 years.

Following her death George continued to find comfort in his children and in their spouses whom he welcomed into the bosom of the family from the first day that he met them. He rejoiced, like any grandparent, in the successes of his grandchildren and would have been particularly delighted in their sporting achievements.

George excelled in sports in his youth and after his time at Foyle College he had a long association with City of Derry Rugby Club, where his grandson Ross now plays for the senior XV, and with Brigade Cricket Club.

Following an injury he became an Irish Rugby Football Union referee until a further injury brought his refereeing days to an end.

But George was not to be deterred by this minor inconvenience; he continued to be involved with both clubs, in due course becoming Chairman of Selectors at City of Derry Rugby Club and an Honorary Vice President at Brigade Cricket Club.

If this wasn't enough, he pursued his growing interest in golf which he played every Saturday morning on the links at Castlerock.

I feel almost breathless as I recount so many of George's life interests – but as someone once said, "There's more!"

In 1968 George received an unexpected invitation to join St Columb's Masonic Lodge in Moville, County Donegal. That event began a long and very fruitful association with Irish Freemasonry, and George progressed through the ranks to take on roles of increasing responsibility until eventually he was installed as Grand Master of Ireland in 2006. In that role he travelled the length and breadth of Ireland, and also travelled to many countries of the world, to meet people, to encourage local lodges and to promote support for masonic charities – something that was very dear to his heart and an aspect that he regarded as absolutely central to the masonic ethos.

In 2013 George began to show signs of dementia and, reluctantly, had to step down from his leadership role in Freemasonry. His condition continued to deteriorate and his family knew that 24 hour care was needed. George found love and support at Sevenoaks Care Home from 2016 until 2018 and at Cornfield Care Home near Limavady for the last three years. George's family wishes me to record their thanks to the Management and Staff at both of these homes for the care and attention that he received over the years; and also to the medical and nursing staff at Altnagelvin Hospital for their care to George in the difficult conditions of recent weeks.

As the son of a parent who suffered from dementia I have seen the effects of this illness – and I know how it can rob a family of the person whom they love. The sufferer loses his or her personality and is not the mother or father, son or daughter whom we remembered as we were growing up. The sufferer lives in his and her own little world, communicating not through words but often through eye contact. Sometimes a glimpse of something from the past is seen, but it is important to continue to love the person even if they do not recognise us – or we them.

Some years ago I conducted the funeral service for a lady who suffered from dementia. On the back of the Order of Service the family had printed a poem – a poem that I found to be informative and inspirational.

Let me share it with you this afternoon.

Do not ask me to remember, Don't try to make me understand. Let me rest and know you're with me. Kiss my cheek and hold my hand.

I'm confused beyond your concept, I am sad and sick and lost. All I know is that I need you To be with me at all cost.

Do not lose your patience with me, Do not scold or curse or cry. I can't help the way I'm acting, Can't be different 'though I try.

Just remember that I need you, That the best of me is gone. Please don't fail to stand beside me Love me 'til my life is done.

I know that you – George's family - can have no regrets about the way that you cared for your father, father-in-law and grandfather. He was always in your thoughts and while it must have at times been distressing to visit him and receive no recognition or communication the fact that he was still your father, father-in-law and grandfather – still a real part of your lives – helped you and in some way may even have helped him.

#### Love me 'til my life is done.

I have no hesitation in saying that as you loved George in life so you will continue to love him in death. He has passed beyond your sight but not beyond your remembrance.

May you – and all who knew George Dunlop – be able to recognise the truth in the words of the apostle Paul: I thank my God every time I remember you.
