



The origin of Saint Valentine's Day is not entirely clear but it seems to have taken root in England.

As far back as Chaucer it was commonly observed that birds began to pair and to mate around the feastday of Saint Valentine, that is from the middle of February.

The Valentine whose name is commemorated on 14th February each year was a Christian priest in Rome who assisted martyrs during the persecution under Emperor Claudius II. He, eventually, was arrested and sent before the Prefect of Rome. When he refused to renounce his faith he was beaten and beheaded in the year 269. By offering his heart he proved himself to be a true devotee of the God of Love.

The shops are already filled with Valentine cards and appropriate gifts. These will be bought and sent by young men and women to their sweethearts during the next few weeks. Husbands and wives will speak of their undying love for each other. The spark of love will be fanned into a bright, warm flame and we will hear, on almost every radio programme, songs that capture the essence of true love.

The special bond that love creates and nurtures in family life will receive attention too. In church circles, people will be reminded of the two-fold command of Jesus, 'Love God' and 'Love your neighbour'.

Love for our neighbours

Our love for our neighbours must always be more than just a nodding of the head or a shaking of the hand. It must be expressed in practical ways, such as a genuine embrace or by providing food or some other resources at a time of need. I'm sure that many of you who are reading these words will be able, from your own experience, to remember a time when a helping hand was offered to you and your family from a most unexpected person. At a moment of need 'the creed and the colour and the name won't matter'

Love for God

Our love for neighbour is important but equally so is our love for God. We are taught to love God with every part of our being — with heart, mind, soul and strength. We are taught to love God because He first loved us. (1 John 4: 19). The words of Jesus recorded by the evangelist Saint John (Saint John 15: 13) 'Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends' is a wonderful revelation of God's love for all people. His love is unselfish. His love is unconditional. His love is eternal.

As we think and talk about **'love'** in these days (love between boys and girls, love between husbands and wives, love between parents and children, love between neighbours) let us allow ourselves to be reminded of the greatest love of all.

That is, God's love for you and for me.

Let us, also, 'read, mark, learn and inwardly digest' the message that we find in 1 John 3: 11-24 and in 1 John 4: 7-21 and put it into practice in our daily lives.

It was with shock, sadness and concern that I heard about – and later saw the images – of the car bomb explosion in Bishop Street last weekend.

I had been away from the City for some days and, unfortunately, was unable to provide any practical assistance to those who were directly affected by this incident.

I want, this morning, to place on record my sincere appreciation of the ministry of my colleague Canon John Merrick and of the way in which other people – including the churchwardens and Robert McGonigle – acted at a time of uncertainty and inconvenience. Thankfully – apart from one window broken in No 6, Saint Columb's Court – the Cathedral and other properties – were not damaged.

Most particularly, we are grateful that no lives were lost and no individual was injured. I hope and pray that the events of last weekend will not be allowed to happen again in this City or elsewhere.

It will not be easy but let us all try to continue to promote peace and reconciliation in this City and Community.



A meeting of the Select Vestry of The Parish of Templemore will be held in Cathedral House, No. 1, Saint Columb's Court on **Tuesday 5**th **February at 7.30 pm.**

One of the items on the Agenda will be The Revision of the Register of Vestrypersons. At the meeting the names of any parishioners who have died, or who have left the parish, during the year will be deleted and, hopefully, new names will be added.

Any parishioner who is eighteen years of age and over may have his/her name added to the

Any parishioner who is eighteen years of age and over may have his/her name added to the Register provided that he/she fulfils the following requirements.

Signs a declaration form that he/she is a member of The Church of Ireland. Is either a resident parishioner or an accustomed member of the congregation.

Declaration forms are available in the Cathedral. Please ask the Dean or the churchwardens for details.

- Q. What is the Register of Vestrypersons?
- A. The Register of Vestrypersons is the list of the names of parishioners and of people who are accustomed members of the congregation, ie. people who 'belong' to the parish but who live outside of the parish boundaries.

It is from this list that people are selected, at the meeting of The General Vestry, - ie. The Annual General Meeting of the Parish held, usually, after Easter - to serve as Churchwardens, Glebewardens and members of the Select Vestry.

- Q. To what will I be committing myself if I sign the Declaration Form?
- A. By having your name on the list you will be doing two things: (1) you will be able to attend the meeting of The General Vestry and to appoint parishioners to various offices, and (2) you will be able if you wish to be nominated for office yourself.

If you have never signed a Declaration Form, or have forgotten that you did sign many, many years ago, we can check the Register for you.





Presidential honour for Larne curate

The Rev Dr Ian Mills, curate in the Parishes of Larne and Inver with Glynn and Raloo, has been appointed President of the Ulster Society of Organists and Choirmasters.

The Society was formed in 1918 as a forum for church musicians and enthusiasts of all denominations.

Today it is thriving, maintaining a busy schedule of monthly events which include visits to organs of historical note and instruments which have been recently built or rebuilt, an overseas tour each May, an

annual Members' Recital, educational events, and masterclasses from distinguished guests. Highlights from its Centenary Celebrations in 2018 included the launch of the Society's history, *A Society Formed* by USOC member Alasdair MacLaughlin, a Centenary Conference and Dinner hosted jointly with the School of Music, Queen's University, and a Service of Thanksgiving in Saint George's Parish Church.

lan, a Minor Canon of Belfast Cathedral, has a very musical background. He grew up in Derry where he was a Chorister in St Columb's Cathedral. He did A-levels at Foyle College before studying a Bachelor degree, a Master's degree and eventually a PhD in Music at Queen's University, Belfast. Before studying at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute, Ian worked as Organist and Master of the Choristers in Derry Cathedral under the leadership of the Very Rev William Morton, now Dean of St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin. He also kept a busy freelance schedule as a recitalist and accompanist, and taught in St Malachy's College and Methodist College, Belfast. Ian was also involved in making music with various choirs and ensembles. Following his ordination as a Deacon in Connor Diocese in August 2017, Ian served an Internship in the parish of St John the Baptist, Agherton, and spent two months on the clergy team at St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast, before taking up the role of curate in Larne following his ordination as a priest last September.

Ian is married to Kelly-Ann, a Registrar in Obstetrics & Gynaecology in the Royal Victoria Hospital and a lecturer in medicine at Queen's University.

His many interests include aviation, gardening and the architecture of the London Underground! Of his appointment, Ian said: "It is a great honour to succeed Professor Desmond Hunter as President of the Ulster Society of Organists and Choirmasters at this exciting time in our history.

"Our Centenary year has provided us with an opportunity to look back over 100 years of USOC and survey the changing landscape of organ playing in Ulster.

"The Society enters its second century aware of the challenges facing church musicians, but also enthused at the opportunities which lie ahead. To that end I look forward to continuing the Society's outreach to new players, especially those of young age, and seeking opportunities for further collaboration with friends in like-spirited organisations." Obituaries

Margaret Davis McElwee 12th October 1926 – 28th November 2018

A funeral service is always tinged with a range of emotions; on the one hand we give thanks for the life of the deceased while at the same time their family is saddened by the loss of a loved one. This is particularly evident today as we give thanks for Margaret's life, a long life, a productive life and most of all a very happy life while you her family are saddened by the passing of a much loved Mother, Grandmother, Great-grandmother and Sister.

As a family and indeed many of us gathered here today, we will have fond memories of the Margaret we knew and loved. I want to share with you a few of my memories. An enduring remembrance will be her smile. Each time you met Margaret you were greeted with that amazing smile which immediately put you at ease. You felt welcomed and that your presence was valued. Even in recent weeks when I visited her on saying who I was a little smile would brighten



her face. Another memory is her love for and devotion to her family. When you spoke with Margaret the conversation always came around to you her family, she would speak with a real sense of joy and pride about you, your lives, your achievements and indeed your sorrows. Of course, ever foremost was the love, devotion and commitment that she shared over many decades with her late husband Jack. An abiding memory will be Margaret's sense of dress. She always ensured that her appearance was flawless, colours coordinated, jewellery to match, as did handbag and shoes and of course her hair beautifully groomed and I have to add that on one of my recent visits her personal hairdresser and friend arrived bringing freshly laundered clothes which she had lovingly washed in her own home, Margaret was not just a client but a friend, someone she obviously respected and admired. Both she and Jack were a sight to behold when they entered this church on a Sunday morning and of course Jack always had a flower in his lapel.

Margaret Davis McElwee was born on the 12th October, 1926 to John and Flora Lumsden at Orchard Row, off the Foyle Road in Londonderry.

Margaret was one of six children born to John and Flora – Agnes, Jean, (Margaret who was the third child) followed by Alex, Billy and Flora. Unfortunately all but Flora have passed away.

Margaret had a happy childhood and family life with her siblings and on leaving school at fourteen she followed many of the young girls in the city who took up employment at one of the thriving shirt factories of the time. Welch Margetson Shirt Factory was where Margaret commenced her career in industry.

It was in 1946 that Margaret's sister Agnes was due to wed and as tradition dictated in those days a 'pre wedding' party was to be held at the Lumsden household the night before the wedding. Someone had mentioned inviting a young man from the Fountain, who had been a POW during the Second World War, to the party. His name was Jack McElwee. It appears that Jack and Margaret's romance blossomed from there. In 1947 Jack and Margaret were married in First Derry Presbyterian Church.

Jack and Margaret had three children, Jacqueline, (who sadly passed away in 1997), Ashley and Greg.

In the early 1970's, Jack became the Steward at the Services Club, Crawford Square in Londonderry. Of course Jack and Margaret had to live on the premises as part of the contractual agreement. It was not long before Margaret joined Jack behind the bar and was a regular fixture almost every night serving 'pints' to the patrons, many of whom became lifelong friends. Life at the Services Club was a 7 day a week, 364 days a year job. So when Jack and Margaret could take a holiday they frequented the USA, where Margaret's sister Jean lived, having become a GI Bride, following the war. Spain and Jersey were also on the McElwee's holiday itinerary.

Margaret and Jack both retired from their employment in the early 1990's, and were sorely missed by the many patrons who frequented the Services Club during their time there. Following retirement they moved to Saint Columb's Court where they created a beautiful home in one of the Court properties, but sadly repeated terrorist attacks on the Court House brought about intolerable damage to their home. They were forced to leave the home they had created for their retirement.

In retirement Margaret enjoyed many holiday and day trips laid on by the Britannia Band of which Jack was a member and Secretary.

In later years following an illness Margaret was admitted to Deanfield Nursing Home in Londonderry. Having remained there for a year Margaret then moved to Culmore Manor Nursing Home where she remained for almost 3 years until her passing. The family would like to extend particular thanks to all the staff at Culmore Manor who made Margaret's life a little happier having left her home at Aughlish Court where she and Jack lived following their time in Saint Columb's Court.

Sadly, as we are all aware Jack passed away in June 2016 and was sorely missed by Margaret.

At the beginning of this address I shared with you some of my memories of Margaret. I now want to share with you my greatest memory and that was the importance of belief, faith, worship and service in and toward her loving heavenly Father and his Son Jesus Christ her Lord. This was the foundation on which she built her life. She was a faithful member of this Cathedral congregation and when she was confined to her Care Homes she constantly bemoaned the fact that she could no longer attend church services. An essential element of any visit was a Scripture reading, prayer and of course the Sacrament of Holy Communion. This faith meant that Margaret had no fear of death and increasingly she looked forward to it because it meant that she would be reunited with Jack in the nearer presence of her Lord and Master.

To you her immediate family, Ashley and your wife Dorothy, Greg and your wife Heather and we remember Jacqueline, who died in 1997 her husband Mervyn.

Grandchildren: Caroline, Jason and Laura, Christopher, Benjamin, Clarissa and Harry, Megan and Patrick. Great- Grandchildren: Rebecca, Alix, Hallie, Riley, Mason and Fionn and to her last surviving sister Flora McCandless.

I offer you my sincerest sympathies as you say farewell to a wonderful Mother, Grandmother and Great-grandmother. Do cherish and uphold the many memories you have of her because they will help you endure the sense of sadness and loss that you are experiencing at this moment. I ask you to hold fast to the great Christian hope that one day we will be reunited with those whom we knew and loved in this life yet see no longer, and of Margaret we pray that she might rest in peace and be raised in Glory. Elizabeth (Lila) Miller 30th March 1930 – 6th December 2018

What a year this has been! This parish has seen the largest number of deaths for many years. I and Canon John Merrick have conducted 25 funeral services, either in this Cathedral, in a Funeral Home or in the home of the parishioner, since the beginning of the year.

And 9 of those funeral services have been within the last 12 weeks.

As I reflect on all of those deaths, I am conscious that I did not know some of those people very well. After less than two years as Rector and Dean it is not possible to have met with and ministered to every person. I am, however, conscious as I prepare for a funeral service that every person is special to his and her family and relatives and I do try to reflect that love and the warmth of the relationship within the service in the home, in the Cathedral and at the graveside.



There will always be some people who stand out more than others – and Lila Miller was one such person. It must be almost 20 years since I first met Lila and Lexie – shortly after I was installed as a Canon in 1999. They were two people whom I always saw and spoke to when I visited the Cathedral as Canon in Residence. And on every occasion Lila and Lexie would enquire about my wife and our daughter – and that interest and concern has continued right up to the present day.

Within one week of my Institution as Rector and Installation as Dean, Canon John Merrick brought me to visit some members of the parish who were in Altnagelvin Hospital or who were confined to their homes. One of those visits was to Lexie and Lila; and at the end of our visit something happened that was to become an important part of almost every visit ever since. Lexie asked me to pray and to minister to both he and Lila with the Laying on of Hands. Both he and Lila believed strongly in this ministry and found great comfort and encouragement in this form of prayer.

Due to ill-health Lila and Lexie have been unable to attend the Cathedral for worship for some years, but as I often said to them, 'If you cannot come to the church, then the church will come to you'. And a pattern of monthly Holy Communion services began to emerge and both Lila and Lexie drew spiritual strength from the Sacrament and I always knew from their response just how much it meant to them. In fact, the Canon celebrated Holy Communion in their home just a few days before Lila became a resident at Daleview House and it was, as we now know, to be the last time that they would receive the Sacrament together in their own home.

Prayer was a source of great comfort to Lila, and particularly in her latter years as her eyesight began to fail and she could no longer read she found help in being able to recite the words of the Psalms. Psalm 95 – or the Canticle 'Venite' as it is also known – was a particular favourite; one that she used in her nightly devotions and that was part of our cycle of prayer by her bedside in the past few days.

One of the parish organisations with which Lila was involved was The Mothers' Union. I invited a long-standing member of The Templemore Branch of The Mothers' Union to share her thoughts about Lila and here is a part of her reflection.

Lila was enrolled in The Templemore Branch of The Mothers' Union in February 1978 and remained a member for over 20 years. She was a most willing member giving of her time to help with catering and other projects.

A quiet person by nature, Lila did not seek or enjoy the limelight. She preferred to work away quietly in the background.

An important trait that many people saw and appreciated in Lila was her ability to listen – and to keep a confidence.

The members of The Mothers' Union remember Lila's generous nature and her willingness to support any event that bore the name of Saint Columb's Cathedral.

Lila was a lady who took time and care with her appearance. She displayed good fashion sense; she was someone who was always immaculately dressed with makeup on, a brooch in her coat and wearing a necklace.

Members also recall her later years in The Mothers' Union; arriving for meetings on the arm of Rosemary Morton, while Lexie child-minded the Morton brothers in the Deanery – playing snooker and talking about football, as well as trying to get 3 young boys off to bed! Due to ill-health Lila resigned from The Mothers' Union but she was always remembered and visited regularly by one of the members, who kept Lila informed about all the events and the good-natured gossip!

There is, of course, one other group of people whose memories and reflections are even more relevant. I refer to Lila's family. Within this group of people she is remembered as someone who made her family her first priority. Lexie and Lila built a strong foundation when they married on 29th December 1956. During the last almost 62 years they have been to each other a strength in need, a comfort in sorrow and a companion in joy. They have laughed together and cried together; they have reached the highs of life and enjoyed them together and they have met and overcome together the difficulties that growing older can bring.

As I reflect on Lexie's and Lila's life it is this aspect of togetherness that speaks so powerfully. A few weeks ago while visiting Lexie and Lila, Lexie shared a story with me – an elderly man and his wife were being interviewed about their long marriage relationship. At the end of the interview the man was asked, 'If you had to live your life again, what would you like to be'? The questioner received the answer, 'Together'.

In the context of that lovely and loving relationship the elderly man only wanted to be with his wife. And when we think about Lexie and Lila – when I recall those occasions when I have been privileged to have ministered to them - that word 'together' is never far away. Lexie put his life and his interests on hold for the past few years because he was (and he still is) a loving, faithful and loyal husband. And Lila in turn was a loving, faithful and loyal wife. Always supportive of Lexie in his role here in the Cathedral as Verger, or in his interests at Brigade Cricket Club, or of the recognition that he received with the Investiture of MBE in 2015. Lila was there at his side – the proud wife. But of course there was an occasion when on 20th March 2008 – Lila's birthday – she and

Lexie were present in Armagh Cathedral to receive the Maundy Thursday Money from Queen Elizabeth. This was a proud moment for both of them – and for their family.

Yes, family was important to Lila.

She was a mother who was devoted to her children, Adrian and Vanessa.

Although having a job as a School Meals Assistant at Fort James when they were growing up, she ensured that she was at home to welcome them when they came home from school. And the family home, with many family photographs, is evidence that a mother's love and interest in her children and her grandchildren was strong to the end.

We read in the Book Proverbs words that, I believe, can apply appropriately to Lila Miller and to her family:

Her children rise up and call her happy; her husband too, and he praises her:

'Many women have done excellently, but you surpass them all.'

Charm is deceitful, and beauty is vain, but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. Give her a share in the fruit of her hands, and let her works praise her in the city gates. (Proverbs 31: 28-31)

Today we remember Lila and we thank God for a life in which love for God and for neighbour was paramount.

We thank God for that long, loving relationship of almost 62 years of marriage and for her devotion to Lexie, Adrian and Vanessa; to Vanessa and Stuart and to Jonathan, Lucy, Sophie, and William.

We thank God for her commitment to this Cathedral Church and for her sincere love for all things holy in this place.

We thank God for the friendship and fellowship that we each enjoyed with Lila, for the example she has left us in sickness and in health, and for the hope and assurance in the Christian Faith that one day we will meet again in the place where sickness and suffering are no more, where every tear is wiped away and where all things are made new.

Isobel Kilpatrick

10th October 1928—12th January 2019 Isobel Hamilton Kilpatrick was born on 10th October, 1928 to Isabella and James Williamson. She was baptised in Saint Columb's Cathedral on the 21st November by Reverend Leslie Lawrenson. The eldest of five children, her siblings were Harry, Mina, Tilly and Jim. The family home was in Bishop Street. Isobel attended Bishop Street School and when she was 14 years old she left school and went to work in Welch Margetson's shirt factory, where she was a side seamer. The calibre of her work was so good, it was used for sample shirts to be shown to prospective buyers such as Marks & Spencer.

In 1946, Isobel met Albert Kilpatrick, whom she always called Bob. Albert (Bob) was in the Navy and was stationed at Sea Eagle. They met at a local dance and Albert was wearing his Navy uniform.



They were married on 7th August, 1947, in Saint Columb's Cathedral by the Reverend Charles Willoughby. They were married the same year as the Queen and they went on to celebrate their 50th Anniversary at a garden party in Hillsborough attended by the Queen. They were also invited and attended a garden party at Buckingham Palace in 1995, to mark 60 years since the ending of World War Two.

Isobel and Bob lived for a short time at Sea Eagle, until they moved to 40 Erne Gardens, where she lived for the rest of her life. When Bob was posted to Hong Kong with the Navy, Isobel refused to go as she had only got her house and it was so important to her to keep the family home.

Isobel was an active member of the Lisnagelvin Women's Group and even in her 90th year was always out meeting people and keeping herself active. She got the bus regularly to Foyleside or to see her family in Limavady.

Isobel was many things to many people; a kind and helpful neighbour, friend, a loving wife, a devoted mother and grandmother.

In conclusion in this life, sadly, when we hear the word legacy we immediately think in terms of property, money and possessions. In Holy Scripture we are told that we should love the Lord our God with all our heart and all our soul and our neighbour as ourselves. This is all we have to do to earn eternal salvation. This is Isobel's legacy to you Pat, Marilyn and Angela, to you Jim and Eddie, to you her grandchildren Ryan, Yvette, Mark and Chris, to you her great-grandchildren Erin, Ethan, Ella, and to you her brother Jim. This is an inheritance that will never fade. It will never suffer loss. It is priceless. She has instilled this in you through word and example. The mantle now passes on to you both individually and collectively. Remember it, honour it and expand it and you will inherit an unfading crown of glory. I know your hearts are saddened today and this is coupled with a sense of emptiness. Support one another in your grief while at the same time reflecting on the many happy and fond memories of life in this home with both your mother, Isobel and your late father Albert (Bob). Please be happy for her as she is now in the nearer presence of her Creator God in the company of her late husband Bob and her siblings where there is no more pain or sorrow but one equal light and joy in the Heavenly places, secure in the knowledge that one day you will be reunited with her and them and so we pray and say "Thanks be to God who has given us the victory".
