The Dean writes.....

Dear Parishioners and Friends

The month of June has many days when the lives of saints are remembered and celebrated.

Wednesday 9: The Feast Day of Saint Columba.
Friday 11: The Feast Day of Saint Barnabas.
Thursday 24: The Feast Day of The Birth of Saint John the Baptist.
Tuesday 29: The Feast Day of Saint Peter.

It would be possible to write about each of these 'saints' in turn but I will focus, this month, on the saint known as Barnabas. His name is not included in the list of the twelve apostles but it is evident that he was sympathetic to the views and ideals of the Early Church.

We read about him and his actions in the Book 'The Acts of the Apostles'.

There was a Levite, a native of Cyprus, Joseph, to whom the apostles gave the name Barnabas (which means 'son of encouragement'). He sold a field that belonged to him, then brought the money, and laid it at the apostles' feet. (Acts 4: 36-37).

In the days after Pentecost the apostles had the task of teaching and preaching to a group of people who questioned who they were and what they were doing. They had the task of showing people who were suspicious the path of Jesus and of encouraging them to follow it. The apostles needed all the support and encouragement that they could find in those early and challenging days and in Joseph (Barnabas) they found a person who was willing to be their friend. He not only 'talked the talk', he also 'walked the walk'. He matched his words with practical actions.

The Book 'The Acts of the Apostles' shows that there was a community spirit among the believers. They were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the disciples' feet and it was distributed to each as any had need.

It was from this mix of people that Joseph (Barnabas) emerged to make his contribution to the needs of his community. Barnabas (son of encouragement) received a welcome from the apostles and, instead of disappearing from the story of the Christian Church after his act of generosity, he was to become a faithful follower and leader in the Church; encouraging the new convert Paul with whom he shared ministry in Antioch and Jerusalem.

Time has moved on, but the voice of encouragement is needed just as much today as it was in the days of the Early Church. It is easy to have an opinion and to be an armchair critic but it can be more difficult and challenging to enter into an event and to play our part in encouraging those who are on the frontline.

Barnabas discovered that as soon as he offered the proceeds of his field he was welcomed by the apostles. They accepted him as their friend and enabled him to have a positive role to play in the Church. As we become people who encourage by word and action opportunities will open up that will enable us to make a difference wherever we are.

Never lose an opportunity during the day to encourage another person. You know what a difference that positive word or action has made in your life. Do your best to make a positive difference in the lives of others.

Be a Barnabas – a son and daughter of encouragement.

Confirmation 2021



Reopening of Church Buildings for Public Worship A Return to In-Person Sunday Worship in the Cathedral

When you arrive at the Cathedral use the hand sanitiser in the porch.

Wear a face covering when you enter and when you leave the building – and throughout the service—unless you are exempted from doing so!

Due to social distancing the Cathedral can accommodate only 100 persons (max).

The pews will be filled from the front to the back, observing social distancing (2 metres).

At the end of the service parishioners who are sitting at the back of the Cathedral will leave first.

Before you leave, please complete the details on the Track and Trace Form and leave it in the vestibule as you exit the Cathedral. (A Track and Trace Form must be completed for every person – adult and child).

When you arrive and when you leave church we, respectfully, request that you do not stand and chat with the clergy, the members of the Cathedral staff, and other parishioners.

We understand that all of us have been accustomed to greeting one another – especially when we are leaving the Cathedral. This is, however, not permitted.

Leave the Cathedral as quickly as possible and do not stand outside chatting to one another.

Please note that all toilet facilities will remain closed until further notice.

Until further notice congregational hymn singing is not permitted.

Thank you for your understanding and co-operation.

HOSPITAL ADMISSIONS



If you or a relative is admitted to, or discharged from, hospitals or nursing homes please let Dean Raymond Stewart or The Reverend Canon John Merrick know if you would like a Pastoral Visit.

Under Data Protection (GDPR) we **do not** have access to the Hospital Admission Forms, so we can only know that you are a patient in a hospital or a nursing home if the Chaplain notifies us or if you or a relative notifies us.

As of Monday 24th May 2021

N.B. It is now possible for clergy to visit in care homes and hospitals, in addition to visits from family members. All local restrictions and procedures should be followed, including, in most cases, advance appointments for care homes.

Bishop Andrew Forster has advised the members of the ordained clergy:

I recommend that you contact hospitals and care homes in advance of visiting to confirm local arrangements. A conversation with the family of a patient in advance of a visit may also be worthwhile to alleviate any concerns on either side.

JUNE BUTLER WALK

The All-Ireland President of Mothers' Union, June Butler, paid a short visit to Londonderry on Tuesday 18th May for the second of her 'Mums in May' walks in the Dioceses of Derry and Raphoe. She was accompanied on her walk by the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, The Right Reverend Andrew Forster, and the President of the Diocesan Mothers' Union, Jacqui Armstrong. Other local MU members also walked the route, observing social distancing requirements along the way.

The walkers set off from a sun-dappled Saint Columb's Park in the Waterside, after being led in prayer – beside artist Niall Bruton's 9 foot statue of Saint Columba – by the MU's Diocesan Chaplain, The Reverend Canon Katie McAteer. The group had also been treated to the first in a series of talks by author, storyteller and tourist ambassador, Hazel Philson, recounting the saint's physical and missionary journey from his birthplace in Gartan, via Derry to Iona, off the western coast of Scotland. The route, which had been mapped out and paced earlier by Jacqui Armstrong and Doreen Sidebottom, took the group across the city's famous Peace Bridge, around the City Walls, past the 'Wee Church on the Walls' – Saint Augustine's – and back across the lower deck of Craigavon Bridge. The walkers stopped en route at Saint Columb's Cathedral, where they were received by the Dean of Derry, The Very Reverend Raymond Stewart. Bishop Andrew led them in prayer, again, and the group were given a short, guided tour by Rector's Churchwarden and Cathedral Historian, Ian Bartlett.

'Mums in May' is an All-Ireland fundraising initiative, which was started in 2012 to mark 125 years of MU in Ireland. The Fund supports new and on-going MU projects in Ireland, as well as specific and important overseas projects. This year, 'Mums in May' is challenging MU members to walk '21 in 21'. This can be 21 yards, laps, miles or something else. June has opted to complete three 7km walks in each diocese in Ireland. The third of her walks in the Dioceses will take place in the Parish of Stranorlar.

RAPHOE HAS A NEW CANON

The Right Reverend Andrew Forster has appointed **The Reverend Judi McGaffin** as a Canon of Saint Eunan's Cathedral, Raphoe. The Reverend Canon Judi McGaffin is the Bishop's Curate in The Parishes of Fahan Upper and Fahan Lower (Bunrana). She succeeds The Reverend Canon Dr Bill Long, formerly Rector of The Parishes of Convoy, Monellan and Donaghmore, who retired from the Stipendiary Ministry of The Church of Ireland in March.

The Rev Judi McGaffin has made history after being appointed the first female canon in the centuries-old history of St Eunan's Cathedral, in Raphoe. Rev Canon McGaffin said she was dumbstruck when she learned that she had been chosen to succeed Rev Canon Dr Bill Long who retired in March.

Canon McGaffin is the second woman appointed as a canon by the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt Rev Andrew Forster. Last June, in Londonderry, Rev Canon Katie McAteer became the first female canon in St Columb's Cathedral's 400-year history.

"I feel honoured and humbled," Canon McGaffin said, "to have been appointed to the Cathedral Chapter of St Eunan and, in truth, it's taking some getting used to. When Bishop Andrew first told me, on the telephone, that he was appointing me Canon, I think he thought something had happened to me: I was dumbstruck, literally – I couldn't speak.

How Templemore Mothers' Union got to know Saint Columba

The very first 'Presidents' Shield' competition was held in 1981. The theme was 'Saint Columba' on the 1460th anniversary of his birth. The project was a tablecloth to be used at branch meetings. Eleven women worked on Templemore tablecloth and it took 263.25 hours at a cost of £19.84. We learned a lot about Saint Columba, not just his height or his red hair but that he had grey eyes. It is said that when the curragh was leaving Ireland he looked back and in Irish said, 'Behold the grey eyes look longingly back towards Ireland.' The team knew every part of the Cathedral where he is depicted. We regretted that we had missed the carving on the Chapter House clock which has a genuinely nice carving of him, the work of the late Reverend Canon Gerry Carson. As you would expect from Templemore Branch we wrote a book about it and there is lots of good information about Oak trees, the shield of Derry Diocese, Derry & Raphoe, the Cathedral Chapter and the City coat of arms.



It was also recorded that for a couple of years we have had a sparrow-hawk hovering over the Cathedral and chucking the remains of his meals down at us. The local press calls him the 'Ecumenical Hawk' as he divides his time between Saint Columba's and Saint Eugene's. So, 40 years on, there is nothing new under the sun! As we have often commented 'We wuz robbed that year' and Strabane MU won the competition.

I suppose, for the sake of the record, it should be recorded that we have new neighbours in the vicinity of the Cathedral. They took full advantage of the quiet in London Street during the lock-down and when the Diocesan Secretary, Gavin, would arrive in the street for work at 8.30am the grey squirrels could be seen running into the Cathedral graveyard and disappearing. I wonder if in 40 years someone will record that they had seen grey squirrels in the graveyard?

Creevagh House Gardens

Having offered to have an Open Day at the gardens at Creevagh House in May 2020 in aid of Cathedral funds. It was disappointing but almost inevitable that it would have to be cancelled as the Covid-19 pandemic took hold in the Spring of that year. The Cathedral Events Committee had made plans for stalls, teas and other attractions for the Open Garden Day and these plans were well advanced for a date in mid-May. The gardens were looking especially splendid having experienced the warmest and driest of weather during March, April and early May.

Following the cancellation a future date in May 2021 was planned provisionally and the lockdown and confinement meant that we could concentrate on adding to the planting and alterations throughout the garden. Projects that had been put on hold over the years have now been progressed so this Spring many of these are completed and the new plants, shrubs and trees have established themselves.

Unfortunately, Covid-19 was not as easily controlled as had been expected and it became a world-wide crisis through Autumn 2020 and into the end of last month. Although Ireland escaped the worst ravages of the disease compared to Brazil, India and many parts of Europe and the Americas it still resulted in lockdowns and restrictions throughout the country. Only now as mass vaccination progresses can we begin to feel some degree of ease. However there is always the shadow of mutant variants in the background and since it is world-wide in its extent we cannot be complacent on our little island.

Although the garden is looking as splendid again this Spring, it has not been possible to have the Open Day which has once again had to be postponed to May of next year. We have had a number of visitors to the garden as individuals and small groups as restrictions have eased but we are still working within the government guidelines.

My sister, Doreen, who lives alone in Holywood, County Down, has spent much of these lockdowns with us at Creevagh and helped considerably with work in the garden. Doreen has a group of lady friends who were keen to visit the garden so on Monday 17 May the group travelled by train to the city where we met them and transported them by cars to Creevagh. They had thoroughly enjoyed the train journey and were much impressed with the views of the city and the refurbished railway station.

The party spent over an hour touring through the gardens and surrounding woodlands, and we explained the history of the house, the coach house and the garden layout as these have developed over 200 years plus. The weather was kind, cool but dry, and a light lunch was served under sun umbrellas on the garden terrace. The group was insistent that they would contribute to the Cathedral fund, knowing that the event had been planned and postponed twice.

We returned them to the railway station for the afternoon train journey and received their thanks and appreciation for a most enjoyable experience. Returning home, we found a pile of envelopes containing thank-you cards and cash donations and I was surprised and delighted that the sum of these came to approximately £250 to which 25% charitable top-up can be added.

THE RECTOR'S ADDRESS

The Coronavirus pandemic has been a part of our lives for the past 13 months. It has affected all of us in some way. It has restricted what we have been able to do, where we have been able to go, and who we have been able to meet. None of us has escaped its tentacles as it has attempted to squeeze every last ounce of energy and hope from our veins. One of the most obvious signs of its impact in this parish has been the closure of the Cathedral for in-person services of worship. During the whole of 2020, out of a total of 52 Sundays, the Cathedral was open for 31 Sundays and closed for 21.

Add to that the closures in 2021 and the total number of weeks (out of a total of 65) that we have been unable to worship together has been 33.

33 Sundays, since March of last year, when we have missed meeting and praying together; when we have missed listening to the organ and the Choir; when we have missed seeing each other.

The Church gates and doors may have been securely locked but, thanks be to God, the worship of the Church continued. And for this I wish to express my thanks to Canon John Merrick, the readers, and the parishioners who assisted us, initially from their homes and later, as we recorded or live streamed services, in the Cathedral.

For all of us this has been a learning experience; something new and challenging needed to be embraced at very short notice. There is one person who, for the past year, has enabled you to be part of the worshipping experience. He has encouraged the members of the worship team and has ensured that you were able to see and to hear each Sunday or weekday.

Robert McGonigle had to learn fast – and he did. There were a few technical problems along the way but not too many; and Robert's perseverance and determination allowed you to see and to hear and in a positive way to engage with the services even though many of you were on the other side of the Bridge – or in some instances on the other side of the world!

Thank you, Robert, for being so willing to engage with social media and technology to allow us to enjoy in the privacy of our own homes the deep spirituality of worship.

The year 2020 began with a celebratory mood as we congratulated **George Martin Mace** who was awarded The Medal of the Order of The British Empire (BEM) **for services to sport and the community in Northern Ireland** and **Simon Graham Hunter**, Chief Executive Officer, Hunter Apparel Solutions Ltd, who was awarded The Medal of the Member of the Most Excellent Order of The British Empire (MBE) **for services to Business and the Economy**, in the Queen's New Year Honours.

Later in the year, **Alan Warke** joined the elite group when he was awarded The Medal of the Order of The British Empire (BEM) **for services to the community of Londonderry during COVID-19**.

Another cause for celebration was **'the coming of age'** of four of the Boy Choristers when they moved up to join the Gentlemen of the Choir. **Lukas Lynch, Luke Doherty, Mark Doherty and Leo Collins** were presented with Certificates on Sunday 25th October to mark this transition. We thank them for the years they have already given to the Cathedral Choir and we wish them well for the future.

The official opening of St Columb's School of Music in Cathedral House, No. 1, Saint Columb's Court was a keynote occasion in the musical life of this City. Hosted by our own **Louis Fields and Nicky Morton**, along with the Music Tutors, the Cathedral was filled to capacity on Saturday 8th February for An Evening Concert featuring Thornhill College Chamber Choir, Ruth McGinley, George Hutton, and the highlight of the evening – The Priests.

The School of Music returned to the Cathedral on Friday 18th December to present a Christmas Concert digitally that was also very much enjoyed and saw some generous on-line donations being made to Zest NI – a charity that carries out tremendous work with regards to mental health.

2020 was a significant year for our Sunday School Superintendent, **Irene Hewitt**. Not only did she and her husband Malcolm celebrate the 45th anniversary of their marriage on Sunday 14th June, but Irene also completed 40 years of teaching in the Cathedral Sunday School.

Although the Sunday School was unable to meet in-person for much of the year, it certainly wasn't idle and the boys and girls were encouraged by Irene to participate in many of the on-line activities organised by the Diocesan Children's Ministry Officer, Mrs Kirsty McCartney. Also celebrating a significant milestone in their lives during 2020 were **Will and Jean Pomeroy** who were 65 years married on Thursday 11th June, **Winston and Nan Carson** who were 60 years married on Thursday 30th July, **Martin and Ray Mace** who were 50 years married on Saturday 22nd August, and **Leslie and Sharon Wells** who were 45 years married on Sunday 7th June.

The year 2020 has for the most part been a year filled with good news stories. Sunday 5th January was another milestone date for the Cathedral and for The Diocese of Derry. On the afternoon of that day the Cathedral was filled to capacity for The Service of the Installation of **The Right Reverend Andrew Forster** as Bishop of Derry.

Bishop Andrew has visited the Cathedral on a number of occasions since then and we have been delighted to welcome him to his Cathedral and to enjoy his fellowship and company. On the following day, Monday 6th January, we received the sad news of the death of a former Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, **The Right Reverend James Mehaffey**. It was his family's wish that a Service of Thanksgiving for his long life and for his episcopal ministry of 22 years as Bishop of Derry and Raphoe should be held in Saint Columb's Cathedral.

The Service of Thanksgiving was held on Saturday 11th January.

We welcomed his family, recognising that he was first a brother, a husband, a father and a grandfather. But he also was a public figure. As a priest and as a bishop of the Church he met and associated with many people from all walks of life and we welcomed many people from the City and Community – and beyond – who knew him and worked with him over many years. Representatives of the Roman Catholic, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in this City were present, as were colleagues from The House of Bishops. His close friend, and his predecessor as Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, The Right Reverend The Lord Eames, delivered the Address.

On Sunday 12th January I expressed my thanks to everyone in the Cathedral family who so willingly assisted in so many ways to ensure that these services were conducted with reverence and dignity.

I said: **It has been a long time since two such large and important services were held within just a few days of each other. For most of us the planning and conducting of these services, that attracted hundreds of people from The Church of Ireland and beyond, was a new and unfamiliar experience so it has been encouraging to have heard how much those who attended appreciated them.**

A visitor to the Cathedral summed up both services in these words: "It was Anglican worship at its best."

The year 2020 saw the appointment of two new members to the Cathedral Chapter. **The Reverend Robert Boyd**, the Rector of The Parish of Glendermott and Newbuildings and **The Reverend Katie McAteer**, the Pastoral Director of The Grouped Parishes of Christ Church, Culmore, Muff and Saint Peter were installed as members of the Chapter at a service on Wednesday 7th October. Since then another appointment to the Chapter has been announced. **The Reverend Colin Welsh**, the Rector of The Parish of Castledawson, will join his colleagues at a service to be held later this year.

As I welcome Robert, Katie and Colin to their respective stalls in the Chancel, I express my thanks to **The Reverend Canon Sam McVeigh** who retired from the Stipendiary Ministry of The Church of Ireland on 31st January of this year. At the time of his retirement he was the Senior Canon on the Chapter (the Prebendary of Cumber). He had been a Canon of this Cathedral since 2001 and both he and myself were ordained in this Cathedral on Sunday 24th June 1979.

The note of celebration has been a constant refrain throughout this Report and it continues as I refer to those who were baptised and those who died during 2020.

7 children were admitted to the Church through The Rite of Holy Baptism and 18 people were laid to rest. Some of those who died were remembered in the context of a funeral service here in the Cathedral, while others were remembered in a more private way.

Because of the COVID-19 restrictions a visit to the family home was not permitted; and gathering around the open grave was only allowed for immediate family members.

In more 'normal' circumstances a larger number of people would have been able to meet to pay their respects, but we tried, while observing the rules, to ensure that each of these people was remembered for the friend that he and she was.

I name those individuals this evening. We thank God for the Christian Faith by which they lived and in which they died.

Bishop James Mehaffey; Betty Holland; Ann Johnston; Ken Wilson; Hazel Young; Janet Jackson; Ruth McCaul; Billy McCallum; Eric Bradley; Sir John McFarland; Phyllis Gallagher; Gladys Bigger; David Bigger; Romaine Jarvis; Lexie Miller; Canon John Mayes; Carol Bell and Sharon Slater.

In addition to these people, another person who died during 2020 was **Roy Adams**.

Roy, who died on Wednesday 2nd September, was a good friend to Saint Columb's Cathedral. He is remembered as a wonderful organist and pianist and as the Trainer of the Cathedral Mothers' Union Choir in 1991.

The Scripture reading that I chose, and that Canon John Merrick read, began with these words: **It is a good thing to give thanks to the Lord.**

The giving of thanks to God and to each other is a key part of celebration which has been, for the most part, a recurring theme of this Report.

The past year has put a great strain on all of us, and on this parish financially.

Yet, we have survived. We have met adversity and overcome it. We have depended on the prayers, support, love and generosity of our family and friends and on all who belong to this Cathedral family.

And in my closing remarks I want to say a sincere **"Thank You"** to those who have played a part in the life and witness of this parish during the past year.

To Ian and Muriel, our churchwardens; to Charlie and William, our glebewardens; to Ray, our Secretary, to Joanne, our Treasurer and to Alan, our Assistant Treasurer, and to the members of the Select Vestry and others who hold special roles in this parish.

I also want to acknowledge the great work done by Robert, our Parish Administrator and by Linda, our Parish Secretary.

In my Report, I have mentioned the Choir, and to Dr Derek Collins, Nicky Morton, the Boy Choristers and the Gentlemen of the Choir, and to the Cathedral Chamber Choir, sincere thanks for your support during a very difficult year.

I have also mentioned the Sunday School, and again sincere thanks to Irene Hewitt and her band of willing helpers for their encouragement to the children and young people during the uncertain days of the past year.

Wherever you are and whoever you are, let us all this evening resolve to continue to love, support and serve this Cathedral parish with the same determination as we have done in past years. May we continue on our journey through this life, with its joys and its sorrows, with its moments of celebration and challenges, in the sure and certain conviction that there is a silent and invisible power for good protecting and guiding us with His everlasting arms – a power for good that we are privileged to know as 'Our Father'.

May I first, on behalf of Dean Raymond Stewart who regrets that he is unable to be present here today, of myself, and of the parishioners of Saint Columb's Cathedral, express to all of you our sincere sympathy.

We remember in our prayers, and offer our love and support to, Dale's mum Ruth, his brother Andrew, his son David and his daughter Anna, and to all the members of the family circle of Samuel and Betty McKnight (Dale's grandparents).

Dale Anthony Bone was born on 16th May 1990 in a military hospital in Germany. Due to his father's occupation Dale lived in many different countries during his early life.

When he was 3 years old the family came to live in Omagh where his father was stationed at Omagh Army Barracks. It was here, living in close proximity to the helicopter pad, that Dale found great enjoyment watching the helicopters taking off and landing.

On one occasion Dale's curiosity got the better of him and he attempted, successfully, to gain entry to the grounds and to stand directly on the helicopter pad. He was soon discovered and marched briskly home by a very concerned member of staff.

Dale, like many of his peers, had a passion for football. Being an avid Arsenal fan he often clashed with his father who was an avid Spurs fan. It took a lot of persuasion by him and his brother Andrew before they were allowed to bring a Gunners shirt into the house!

Dale played football at school. He was a member of the under 11's team every Saturday morning.

When Dale was 12 years old the family returned to Londonderry and Dale enrolled as a student at Faughan Valley High School. He, later, attended Maydown Training Centre where he learned painting and decorating; receiving at the end of his two years there the distinction of Young Apprentice. This boosted Dale's confidence and he went on to do an apprenticeship in painting and decorating.

COVID-19 and the lockdown restrictions has affected many people, physically and emotionally. It, certainly, had an adverse effect on Dale's health. He struggled to cope and, even though he had the support of his mum and many of his friends, he was in a dark place for much of the time.

One of his brighter times occurred in August of last year. He, his mum Ruth, his son David and his daughter Anna spent some quality time together in Ballycastle.

Those days now remembered bring many fond memories to the family.

Dale, although separated from his family, is still loved and remembered by all who knew him. They can gain comfort in the knowledge that the pains and anguish of the past months are ended. Dale is now at peace, with God and with himself.

Billy Walker was one of three children born to Douglas and Helen Walker of 6 Moore Street in the Waterside area of this city. His siblings are his sister Ann, and his brother Charlie who died 11 years ago. The Walker family 'belonged' to Glendermott Parish Church and it was here that Billy was baptised and confirmed.

His early education was at Clooney Primary School; upon reaching his teenage years he enrolled at Clondermott Intermediate School. On leaving school he found employment in the NHS, working at first at St Columb's Hospital in Browning Drive.

He, later, was employed, during the 1970's when 'The Troubles' were at their height, in the Plaster Room at Altnagelvin Hospital. His final employment took a different direction in that he worked at Coolkeeragh Power Station.

In later years, Billy served his city and community – hoping that his membership of the B Specials and later of the UDR would contribute to lasting peace and stability in the place that he knew and loved. This aspect of life was also evidenced through his employment as a Security Man at the City of Derry Airport.

Billy married Marion Hetherington at Christ Church on 18th December 1965.

They began their married life at 6 Henry Street, in the shadow of Saint Columb's Cathedral, and they were blessed with two daughters – Caroline and Sharon.

As we all know Sharon died, just five months ago, on Wednesday 23rd December 2020.

It was a very distressing time for Billy and Marion and the pain of her death is still relived every day. Billy, while his health permitted, was a very active man.

His great interest and passion was sport – particularly football.

He watched football on television but he really loved to see live action and he encouraged younger players during his time as Manager of Lincoln Courts Football Club and of Churchill Football Club. In more recent years he had taken up the game of bowls and he enjoyed the chance to play and to socialise with other team members.

Billy also kept active in his garden; enjoying planting, sowing and reaping; and his lawn was really something to behold! Not a blade of grass out of place!!

For the past five years Billy has, sadly, been dogged with ill-health. Visits to Altnagelvin Hospital, Antrim Area Hospital and the Royal Victoria Hospital in Belfast for consultations and treatments became for him a regular feature of life. It was a part of life that Billy didn't enjoy but that he accepted and he always showed his appreciation to the members of staff for their care and concern. In all of this he was wonderfully supported by Marion and his daughters. Today, as we leave Billy in the presence of God, his creator, redeemer and judge, the empty chair in the family home assumes a new significance. It will remind you that Billy is not with you in person – but always remember that he is with you in spirit. His life has not ended – it has just changed.

And although dead he continues to speak to you; to remind you of his love; and to encourage you in the changed circumstances of the future.
