

One of the readings at Ascension-tide is Acts 1: 1-11. Here we read that when Jesus had ascended to Heaven two men dressed in white appeared to His disciples. They asked them,

"Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking into the sky?"

One of the messages of the Ascension is 'Look Up'. We are reminded that we must seek those things that are above and to set our thoughts on the things of God. We must focus our minds – our spiritual eyes – on God and on His Son, Jesus. This is what Christians do. They look to God and to His Son Jesus for help, guidance, inspiration and encouragement. I believe that people of faith, and also people who have very little interest in God, religion and the Church, have been among the first to seek an answer during the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic by focusing on a power that is greater than themselves. I believe that instead of ignoring God people have been drawing closer to Him and soaking up the spiritual strength and hope that come from Him.

The Psalmist (Psalm 14) wrote - The fool has said in his heart, 'There is no God'.

Why is it, then, that many people who say that they do not believe in God, who do not come to church, ask for prayer, a sign of hope, in a time of need? When things are going well they depend on themselves and their own resources, but at a time of sickness, tragedy and bereavement they turn to God for help.

They look up - literally and metaphorically - to the Source of that help.

We will do well to echo the words of Psalm 121 – I will lift up my eyes to the hills; from where is my help to come? My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth.

God is our Creator and Sustainer. He made us and He cares for us.

We find it difficult to understand why people suffer and why terrible things happen in the world, but we do believe that God cares. He listens to our questions and He reaches out through His Son Jesus Christ to meet our needs. We need to be people of faith and not of fear; people who live with certainties and not with questions and doubts.

Ascension-tide also encourages us to 'Look Out'; to look around us and to acknowledge the needs of other people. During the past 14-15 months I know that many people in this parish have been doing this very thing. They have seen the needs of their neighbours and have responded. I applaud you for this. All efforts, however small, make a difference.

We will do well to continue to keep our eyes and ears open and alert to the needs of individuals and families in this parish, city and community. COVID-19 has not gone away and it continues to spread its deadly tenticles and to attempt to squeeze every last ounce of energy and hope from our veins.

I was watching a Church Service on RTE television on last Sunday, 25<sup>th</sup> April. During the Service in Christ Church, Bray, County Wicklow the Rector, The Reverend Baden Stanley, gave a number of 'reflections' on the theme of the day – The Good Shepherd.

He reminded his listeners that towards the end of His life on earth Jesus gave three instructions to His disciple Peter. "Feed my lambs". "Tend my sheep". "Feed my sheep". (Saint John 21: 15-17).

He explained that this is what all of us should be doing every day; looking out for each other and caring for each other – just as Jesus, the Good Shepherd, cares for each one of us.


We recognise his long service to this Nation and to all of the Nations of the Commonwealth. We rejoice in the Christian Faith by which he lived and in which he died.

## Reopening of Church Buildings for Public Worship A Return to In-Person Sunday Worship in the Cathedral

When you arrive at the Cathedral use the hand sanitiser in the porch. Wear a face covering when you enter and when you leave the building – and throughout the service.

Due to social distancing the Cathedral can accommodate only 100 persons (max). The pews will be filled from front to back, observing social distancing (2 metres). At the end of the service parishioners who are sitting at the back of the Cathedral will leave first.

Before you leave, please complete the details on the Track and Trace Form and leave it in the porch as you exit the Cathedral. (A Track and Trace Form must be completed for every person – adult and child).

When you arrive and when you leave church we, respectfully, request that you do not stand and chat with the clergy, the members of the Cathedral staff, and other parishioners. We understand that all of us have been accustomed to greeting one another – especially when we are leaving the Cathedral. This is, however, not permitted.

Leave the Cathedral as quickly as possible and do not stand outside chatting to one another. Please note that all toilet facilities will remain closed until further notice.

Until further notice congregational hymn singing is not permitted.



The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe has recalled the late Prince Philip's contribution to peace in Ireland as one of The Duke of Edinburgh's many legacies. His remark came during his sermon at a Special Service in St Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry on Friday evening, marking the death of His late Royal Highness.

In his sermon, Rt Rev Andrew Forster said they had gathered to give thanks for an extraordinary life and an extraordinary influence right across the world. Bishop Andrew recalled how, as a baby, Prince Philip had been rescued with his family from political turmoil in Greece and how he had been carried off in a cot made from an orange box into exile. "The next years are well documented, characterised by disruption, break-up, grief and misfortune. When he joined the Royal Naval College at Dartmouth, whether by his wry sense of humour or the reality, when



he registered he signed up as 'Prince Philip of Greece and Denmark, of no fixed abode.'
"Yet this young man, from such a fractured and disrupted background, would go on to ingrain himself in the consciousness of our country and Commonwealth, and transform the lives of many through his deep commitment to improve lives. In some way, Prince Philip could be seen as the Good Samaritan who was not prepared to pass by on the other side when he saw people whose lives he could help change for the better. And perhaps that commitment was borne out of his early hardship.

Bishop Andrew referred a number of times in his sermon to the naval command, 'Action Stations', which summons all hands to battle stations on warships and which will be played by buglers as The Duke's body is laid to rest in the royal vault at Windsor Castle. "As a naval officer he would have heard the sound, 'Action Stations' during his distinguished career in the Second World War – mentioned in dispatches, saved his own ship from certain destruction – and on The Queen's accession to the throne in 1952, when he had to walk away from his beloved career, it was again as if 'Action Stations' had been sounded, as his life of seemingly perpetual action and motion shifted to dedication in supporting The Queen. There was no job description, there was no one to tell him what he should do or shouldn't do, and he carved his way in making life better for those whom he served, and in dutiful care and love for our sovereign Queen."

Bishop Andrew said the qualities of Prince Philip's life had been spoken of at length over the past week: duty, service, diligence, discipline, straightforwardness and straight-talking. Many had said that Prince Philip's greatest legacy was The Duke of Edinburgh Award – a scheme borne out of his desire to improve lives and make people's lives better.

"There are many facets of his remarkable legacy," the Bishop said, "and perhaps all of us would choose different things that we would say about his legacy and that we would celebrate – war hero, innovator, whatever it might be – but perhaps his greatest legacy of all is as the man who walked a few paces behind The Queen, and was always right behind her, physically and emotionally: with her, supporting her, guiding her, loving her, caring for her, always at 'Action Stations' to support Her Majesty.

"As The Queen herself said on their 50th wedding anniversary, he was her strength and stay all these years, the man behind perhaps one of the greatest monarchs in history, her liege man of life and limb, always ready to use the soft power for the greater good, including building peace in this island. A man who was prepared to put aside in many ways his own great grief at the loss of his uncle in the Troubles, to reach out, to try to do the best to help this island to move to better days – again the desire to make life better for people."

Bishop Andrew described The Duke of Edinburgh as a man of deep faith. He said that Prince Philip and The Queen had sought to live their lives in the public gaze by the principles of Almighty God. "Tomorrow, as he is laid to rest, at his request 'Action Stations' will be sounded. Tonight, we are thankful for a life lived at 'Action Stations'; a life that is an example to each one of us; a very long life, remarkably lived; a life that made a difference in the lives of many; and a life that in some small way we can seek to mirror by making a difference for the good in the lives of those around us. 'Those who conquer will inherit these things, and I will be their God and they will by my children.'"





#### The Leprosy Mission and India

I am sure you are all aware of the catastrophic situation in India at present with the huge numbers of people who are infected, very seriously ill and dying from Covid-19. In a very overcrowded country where most people are

extremely poor, hospitals just about cope to provide health care, although many people are so poor they cannot afford any healthcare or medications. At the moment, most hospitals have run out of oxygen, which is essential as most people who contract Covid-19 badly have severe respiratory problems. Also, only a tiny number of people have received any vaccination. People are literally dying in the street from lack of treatment and the hospitals are totally overwhelmed.

This obviously has a serious knock-on effect for the work of The Leprosy Mission in India. As leprosy patients are already vulnerable, many have also contracted covid-19, which makes their recovery much more challenging. Many of the doctors, nurses, therapist and other staff at the TLM hospitals have become ill or died and have not been replaced and rehabilitation workshops have had to close. This has created a dreadful situation for leprosy patients and made the work of TLM much more difficult.

We, in Europe, find it very difficult to take in this level of poverty and lack of health care, but to give a practical example, I recently read that a donation of £8 would feed an Indian family for a week and many people, even if they are lucky enough to have jobs, live on £1-2 daily! Therefore, I appeal to you to support TLM as generously as you can and pray for the desperately poor people of India in the grips of this awful pandemic.

#### **Visiting**

With a depleted staff, the Dean and Mr. Bradley are trying to cover the wide area over which the Parish now extends, including several new housing estates into which Cathedral parishioners are going week by week.

On the following week, **Thursday 18<sup>th</sup>**, all those Confirmed will meet in the Cathedral for instruction concerning their First Communion (on WHITSUNDAY at 8 a.m.).


#### MAY DAY IN MERRIE OLDE ENGLAND

Many folklore customs have their roots planted firmly back in the Dark Ages, when the ancient Celts had divided their year by four major festivals. Beltane or 'the fire of Bel', had particular significance to the Celts as it represented the first day of summer and was celebrated with bonfires to welcome in the new season. Still celebrated today, we perhaps know Beltane better as May 1st or May Day.

Down through the centuries May Day has been associated with fun, revelry and perhaps most important of all, fertility. The Day would be marked with village folk cavorting round the maypole, the selection of the May Queen and the dancing figure of the Jack-in-the-Green at the head of the procession. Jack is thought to be a relic from those enlightened days when our ancient ancestors worshipped trees. These pagan roots did little to endear these May Day festivities with the either the established Church or State. In the sixteenth century riots followed when May Day celebrations were banned. Fourteen rioters were hanged, and Henry VIII is said to have pardoned a further 400 who had been sentenced to death.

The May Day festivities all but vanished following the Civil War when Oliver Cromwell and his Puritans took control of the country in 1645. Describing maypole dancing as 'a heathenish vanity generally abused to superstition and wickedness', legislation was passed which saw the end of village maypoles throughout the country. Dancing did not return to the village greens until the restoration of Charles II. 'The Merry Monarch' helped ensure the support of his subjects with the erection of a massive 40 metre high maypole in London's Strand. This pole signalled the return of the fun times, and remained standing for almost fifty years.

Maypoles can still be seen on the village greens at Welford-on-Avon and at Dunchurch, Warwickshire, both of which stand all year round. Barwick in Yorkshire, claims the largest maypole in England, standing some 30 meters in height. May Day is still celebrated in many villages with the crowning of the May Queen.
