



ne Dean Dear Parishioners and Friends

The Son of God was known by many names. 'Jesus'; 'Lord'; 'Saviour'; 'Messiah'. The name that I like is **'Emmanuel'.**The angel reminded Joseph of what had been foretold by the

prophet Isaiah. 'Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel' (Saint Matthew 1: 23). The name 'Emmanuel' means 'God is with us'.

When Jesus was born He entered into very humble surroundings. His bed was a manger in a stable. His first visitors were shepherds from the nearby hills. He was born, like each of us, as a small, weak, vulnerable and dependent baby.

Christmas, when we celebrate the birth of Jesus, shows us God's love for the world. God loved so He gave His Son, Jesus. He became a human being and entered into time and space to share life with us.

The name 'Emmanuel' expresses hope and confidence for the present and for the future. Whatever our circumstances God is with us. We don't have to face the difficulties and challenges of life on our own. There is the assurance of divine help from One who is 'our refuge and strength: a very present help in trouble'. (Psalm 46: 1).

This Christmas, for many people, will be a sad time. They will have to spend the festive season in their own home, in a hospital ward, or in a nursing home, away from their families and close friends. They will be unable to celebrate as they used to do when they were younger. And then there are those families who have been bereaved during the year. This Christmas will be a sad time for them because the empty chair will remind them of someone whom they loved and who shared past Christmasses with them.

There are, also, people who are hungry, who live on the streets, who are poor. We see them lying in the shop doorways in this City. So many people feel alone, especially at Christmas when they see other people enjoying the festive season with their relatives.

The name 'Emmanuel' brings a message for all such people. It tells us that, although we may feel alone, unloved and unwanted, we are never so because **God is with us.** He loves each of us and He cares about each of us.

May this message bring you hope and fill you with renewed confidence this Christmas and throughout 2020.

My wife Patricia and our daughter Dione join with me as I wish you and your family a very Happy Christmas and a very Blessed New Year.

The wreaths were laid at the War Memorial by Richard Doherty, Kevin Duncan and Maurice Brown. The sermon was preached by the Dean, The Very Reverend Raymond Stewart.


Christmas Holy Communion

The Crocus Project

Holocaust Memorial Day falls on the 27th January. On this day in 1945 Soviet troops stumbled across Auschwitz Concentration Camp in Poland. The sight that met them left an indelible mark on their lives.

Altogether six million Jews were murdered during World War II.

One and a half million of these were children. Thousands of other children were put to death, together with Roma/Sinti people, people with disabilities and others because of their nationality, the colour of their skin, their faith, their sexuality or because they opposed the Nazis.

Each year Holocaust Trusts around Europe supply one and a half million yellow crocus bulbs to schools. The crocuses bloom at the very beginning of Spring reminding us that even after the most terrible of events, new life begins, and we have the hope of a better future.

As we watch yellow crocuses bud and bloom this January, let us remember the children of the Holocaust. This prayer was found written on a piece of wrapping paper near the body of a child in Ravensbruck, where 92,000 women and children died. It is a powerful demonstration

of faith, hope and resilience existing amidst fear, angst and deprivation.

O Lord, remember not only the men and women of goodwill but also those of ill will. But do not only remember the suffering

But do not only remember the suffering they have inflicted on us,


Remember the fruits we bought thanks to this suffering,





'War and Peace' is a novel by the Russian author Leo Tolstoy. It was published in 1869. The novel focuses on the period 1805-1820 and chronicles the French invasion of Russia and the impact of the Napoleonic era on Tsarist society through the stories of five Russian aristocratic families. I have never read the novel and at this moment in time I have no intention of reading it. I may do so at some time in the future.

It is not the content of this novel that interests me today. It is it's title. 'War and Peace'. I have reflected that these words – 'War' and 'Peace' – are often associated with Remembrance-tide. They are included in the words that are spoken, read and sung at War Memorials, Cenotaphs and in Cathedrals and Churches where people gather on Remembrance Sunday to remember those people from their cities, towns and communities who died in – as well as those who served in and survived – 2 World Wars and all subsequent conflicts.

The words 'War' and 'Peace' are ingrained on our minds and they find expression in the liturgical services to which many people come on this most poignant of days.

These words encompass two completely opposite ideas and concepts.

One is the antithesis of the other. One is to be opposed, deplored and rejected.

The other is to be embraced and worked for with passion.

I have reflected that in the liturgical services of the Church there are many occasions when peace is prayed for; when those who are peacemakers are remembered and encouraged in prayer; and when 'ordinary' men and women are reminded of their duty, under God, to be 'instruments of His peace and channels of His love'. I can find no instruction in the Bible to pray that War and all of the consequences that follow from it should be visited upon the world. We are, however, instructed and encouraged to love our enemies and to pray for those who persecute us. (Saint Matthew 5: 43).

War is something that should be avoided if at all possible. It may be considered to be a legitimate means to deter humans from killing and destroying each other, but history has shown that nothing good comes from war, nothing positive is achieved when an individual seeks to kill, injure and destroy a fellow human being.

I have reflected that those from this City and Parish who signed up for service in 2 World Wars and subsequent conflicts were warm-hearted Christian people. They were not sadistic murderers who went to foreign battlefields so that they could inflict pain on another person. They did not go to War so that later they could gloat about the number of people whom they killed.

That is not the way that I would wish to remember my great-uncle George Whitford and his cousin, both of whom served in the First World War, and I am equally certain that it is not the image that you would want to have of those whom you knew and loved.

Those who died for their country in war, those whom we knew and whose memory we treasure, were ordinary men who saw it as their duty to their King and to their Country to fight for freedom and justice so that future generations could, hopefully, enjoy a lifetime of peace. Those who were fortunate to survive the horrors of the Wars and returned home were reluctant to speak about their experiences.

The sound of the bomb and the bullet, the smell of dead bodies and the horrific memories of unimaginable pain and suffering were carried with them to the grave. Their experiences would lead them to say that there must be a better way for nations and individuals to solve their problems than to resort to violence.

It was Prime Minister Winston Churchill who coined the memorable phrase:

'To jaw-jaw is better than to war-war'. Solutions to problems are better decided in dialogue and discussion around a table, face to face, than in the squalid arena of a battlefield.

Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, would show us a more satisfactory way to live and to engage with those with whom we might disagree. In the culture in which He lived and that is continued up to the present day, a greeting filled with a positive message can be heard in many Jewish communities. The greeting 'Shalom' is much more than the well rehearsed greeting of 'Hello, how are you?'. Its message is stronger and deeper than that.

To be greeted with the word 'Shalom – Peace be with you' – is to hear the person praying for you. It is a prayer for good, not for harm.

It is a prayer for your wellbeing; a wish for all that will be good for you today and for all times. To greet someone with such a positive message must, I suggest, have a significant effect upon his life. Even those who dislike you can be changed by such a prayer.

Here is someone whom I dislike praying for me with the intention that only good things will happen to me today.

There is a message here, I believe, for those who are in positions of leadership in this and every land. So often, in recent times, we have seen leaders of our country reduce others to tears by words that have been lacking in any semblance of Christian understanding. What a real difference there could be, what a real transformation there could be, in our cities, towns and communities – and in the world in general – if everyone spoke that word of peace to those whom they meet every day.

Shalom – Peace be with you. I wish you all that will be good for you today and for all times. We point the finger of blame at the leaders of society and suggest that they should know

better and behave not like spoilt children but as mature adults. However, you and I, the ordinary members of society cannot and must not escape the word of criticism either. We, also, have often failed because we have not embraced the concept of peace.

Our words, our actions and our lives have been less than convincing.

Jesus calls all of us, whoever we are and whatever our status, to shield the fragile plant of peace and to allow it to grow and give hope to all.

In the year 1955, Jill Jackson-Miller and Sy Miller wrote a song for The International Children's Choir based in Long Beach, California. The song, **Let there be peace on earth,** is still popular 64 years later.

It includes these challenging words: Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me. On this Remembrance Sunday let us, each one, pledge ourselves to pray for, to work for and to live for the peace that embraces people of all classes, colours and creeds.

And in the words of the prayer of Saint Francis of Assisi, let us strive to be **instruments of God's peace and channels of His love.**



Obituaries ...

Samuel Robert McCorkell 30th October 1947 – 1st November 2019

We meet today to remember and to pay tribute to Sammy McCorkell, to thank God for his life, to recall how his life touched our lives in different ways and at different times – and to uphold in prayer the members of his family.

Let me begin by expressing sympathy on behalf of myself, Canon John Merrick, and the members of The Parish of Templemore, to Brian and your wife Patricia, Simon and your wife Barbara, Sarah and your husband Graham, and to Roslyn; to the grandchildren Matthew and Jack, to Sammy's siblings – Andy and your wife Kathleen, George and your wife Nuala, Carol and your husband David, to Michael, husband of Sally; and to your families.

We pray for you today and it is our hope that we will fulfil our Christian duty to continue to pray for you in the future.

Samuel Robert McCorkell was born 72 years ago on 30th October 1947.

The son of Sammy and Sadie, his siblings were Andy, Sally, Betty, George and Carol. The Baptism Register of this parish records that Samuel Robert McCorkell, the son of Samuel and Sarah McCorkell of 2 Clarence Place, Londonderry was baptised in this Cathedral Church on 8th November 1947. The Rite of Holy Baptism was administered by The Reverend George Charles Willoughby, the Curate-assistant.

The McCorkell family lived at Northland Way and worshipped in this Cathedral where Sammy attended Sunday School. His mother Sadie was the Brown Owl so it wasn't long before Sammy took an active interest in the Uniformed Organisations. He was enrolled as a member of the Cathedral Cub Scout Pack and of the Cathedral Scout Troop. He gained much from the years that he spent in these organisations and later helped to coach the Cathedral Cub Scout Pack Football team along with his good friend Harry Robinson.

Sammy's first job was as an apprentice with Archibalds where, under the wise guidance of the late Davey Wilson, he learned his trade as a plumber. Later, he moved on to work for GPO/BT and it is of interest to record that his crew was responsible for laying the first fibre optic internet cable in Northern Ireland.

Sammy found time in his busy home life and in his working responsibilities to relax – in, perhaps, an unusual way! He took part in many marathons. He spent many hours training for these events and on one occasion he achieved a personal goal when he completed a marathon in under 3 hours. That is no mean achievement – when you consider that a marathon is just over 26 miles, Sammy was pushing along at almost 9 miles per hour!

During 1967 Sammy was a patient in Altnagelvin Hospital and it was here that he met a student nurse named Mary. I don't know if it was love at first sight but romance blossomed and two years later, in 1969, Sammy and Mary were married in Pennyburn Chapel. Their married life began in the Glen Estate and soon their home resounded to the patter of tiny feet. No, it wasn't an infestation of mice!. It was Brian, Simon, Sarah and Roslyn who began to make their presence felt and to play their part in family life.

Life has not always been easy or kind to Sammy. Dogged by ill-health, he was forced to take early retirement but he was not one to sit back and moan about his lot — he soon found new interests to fill his day. Fishing, playing golf, painting and gardening were some of the new activities with which he engaged. He always was willing to undertake a new adventure and quickly learned to embrace new disciplines.

Sammy was well known by his neighbours in Elmgrove. His love of gardening and the way that he cared for his property endeared him to his neighbours just as much as their enjoyment of the fruits of his labours. Sammy was generous and always willing to share the produce of his gardening skills with his neighbours, and many of them have enjoyed potatoes, lettuces and tomatoes that grew on Sammy's patch of ground.

Sammy was a people's person. He loved to engage in conversation and every day as he walked 'wee Daisy' around the Estate he would stop and chat with his neighbours.

As I have mentioned, life has not always been easy or kind to Sammy and this is particularly true when we think of a sad occasion just over 4 years ago. For many months Sammy's wife Mary was seriously ill; attending hospital in Belfast and here in Derry; and finally being admitted to the Foyle Hospice where she passed into glory on 16th August 2015. Sammy had the support of his family but he so missed Mary. He had seen the medical and spiritual support that she had received in the Hospice. He had seen the respect and dignity shown to her in her final days and he was determined to show his gratitude and appreciation for that love and care. Soon, another adventure was planned.

Sammy learned to make jam! I don't know what kind of jam it was or how good it tasted. I suspect that it tasted wonderful because it sold like the proverbial hot- cakes and Sammy was able to contribute £1000 to the work of the Foyle Hospice.

The work of the Hospice was a cause close to his heart. He played an active part in fund-raising through sponsored walks and other activities; but he will best be remembered for visiting many local homes in the run up to Christmas disguised with a white beard and a big red coat and trousers! So convincing was he that even those who were closest to him did not suspect who it was who was underneath the elaborate Santa costume!

In the past few years that I have been the Rector of this Parish I didn't have the opportunity to get to know Sammy really well but from those occasions that I did meet him I saw a person of faith. Not so many weeks ago he attended the Tuesday morning Service of Holy Communion where he conversed with his Lord and later with his fellow worshippers. It was his intention 2 weeks ago to attend the Ministry of Healing Service on the Feastday of Saint Luke, but was prevented from doing so by a bad cold.

I believe that Sammy appreciated the ministry of the Cathedral clergy, particularly during the past weeks when he was in hospital. The care and support of the medical team in Ward 26 of Altnagelvin Hospital to him and to his family was outstanding and much appreciated. But the care and support to Sammy by his own children and siblings should not be overlooked. There was always a family member in the room or close by should Sammy need something or wish to hear a familiar voice.

Your ministry to your father and brother is gratefully acknowledged today.

It has been noted by Sammy's family and others that he died, peacefully, just before 8.00 pm on the evening of Friday 1st November. This date is the Feastday of All Saints' — a day when we remember those who 'once were comrades of our way'; the ordinary men and women who influenced and encouraged us and whose memories we cherish. We tend to think today of saints as particularly holy people; an elite group whose lives were perfect; but this is not the Biblical understanding of a saint. The Bible considers a saint to be someone who is a down-to-earth individual; someone who made mistakes, who learned from those mistakes and to tried to do better. On the Feastday of All Saints' we celebrate the lives of those ordinary men and women who struggled to live out their faith in difficult days and in difficult circumstances.

In the last book of the Bible, the Book of Revelation, the author John shares with us his vision of Heaven. It is a place of peace and tranquillity where death is no more; where mourning and crying and pain have no place.

In this vision John sees a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages.

The question is asked, "Who are these people and where have they come from?" And the answer is given, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

We learn that for these people all pain and suffering are no more; that the old order of things has passed away and all things are being made new.

It is into this new experience that Sammy entered on Friday evening. For him all pain and suffering has passed away. He has been welcomed into his new home by that multitude who has gone before and who stand on the heavenly shore to welcome those who join their company day by day.

To that company Sammy McCorkell now belongs. You, his family, mourn his death today and as you celebrate a life filled with love, kindness and generosity you await the day of God's choosing when you will see him again. On that day your hearts will rejoice and your joy will be complete.

Cyril Stewart Morrison 25th March 1936 - 6th November 2019

We are gathered here today in this family home, designed and built by Cyril, to support you, Nan, and your family as you say an earthly farewell to a much-loved husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother and uncle. We also want, and need, to give thanks to God for Cyril's life, remembering all that was good, true and faithful in that life. We remember also today Cyril's many and varied outreaches to the people and communities in which he lived and worked - he was constantly aware of the needs of others.

Cyril was born in Belfast on 25th March of 1936. He lived in Beech Lawn Park, Dunmurry. As a young man he was a keen cyclist and cycled through Europe with a group of close friends.

He met Annie at a dance in the Floral Hall. After courting for a while they were married on 7th September 1962 at Saint Nicholas' Parish Church on the Lisburn Road. Cyril worked as a Quantity Surveyor. Eventually work took the family from Belfast to Limavady where he and Nan raised their 3 sons Alan, Colin and Derek.

Cyril developed an interest in table tennis which he used to relax from his stressful job. In his usual enthusiastic way he was soon running and supporting several clubs, all the while encouraging new players. Cyril decided to support his love of history and his family's education by purchasing the Encyclopaedia Britannica. The Encyclopaedia became a project, and this was soon read volume to volume, cover to cover.

In the nineties Cyril was working with the Northern Housing Executive and with all his boys having left the Nest the decision was taken to move to Londonderry where he designed and built their home. Having completed the Encyclopaedia Britannica, he decided to persue an interest in Philosophy and different religions.

Now as an Irish table tennis association coach he continued to encourage and grow the sport by bringing coaches to the city from different countries.

With no work to slow him down he and Nan travelled across the world visiting countries as diverse as China and Russia. In his retirement their travels together provided inspiration for his new interests of Calligraphy and painting. Combining Calligraphy and painting he soon put his artistic talents to work reproducing the book of Kells, an illustrated manuscript containing the 4 Gospels of the New Testament. Word spread and he was called to Dublin to prove he wasn't a master forger! The works he leaves behind are displayed in the Cathedral for the enjoyment of all.

Cyril supported his family and loved his wife Nan for 57 years and would often say that the best night of his life was when they met. She remains his love and best friend. His legacy spans the generations and he was delighted to meet his great granddaughter.

There can be no doubt that Cyril was a man of deep faith. For many years a regular worshipper, supporter and contributor to Saint Columb's Cathedral – a true Anglican. It has to be said, however, that he was very comfortable with, and accepting of, other faiths and religions, and through this he realised and accepted that the spirt of God was universal and the concept of a loving deity was shared equally by others. We give thanks today for his intellect, his enquiring mind and his artistic skills.

We extend our sympathy to you Nan, to Alan and Marjorie, Colin and Rhona, Derek and Lisa, the grandchildren Yasmin, Annelise, Christopher, Lydia, Megan, Jacob and Racheal, great-granddaughter Amira, and to you Iris, his sister, and your family – you are all grieving today and that grief will draw you closer as Cyril's family.

In the midst of that grief, never forget death is not an end, but the beginning of a new and better life in God's nearer presence and Cyril awaits you there, waiting for the day when you will join with him in the heavenly places where there will be no pain, sorrow and illness, but one equal joy in the company of all the saints. Today we say of Cyril – Well done, thou good and faithful servant.

Elizabeth (Lily) Fielding 30th December 1930 – 22nd November 2019

Eight days ago when I was driving along the Limavady Road I called in to The Rectory Field Home to see Lily. She was sitting in the Community Room with one or two other residents, and her first words to me were, "I didn't expect to see you. You're a busy man". I assured Lily that I was never too busy to call to see her and to check on how she was getting on. In the course of our conversation she told me that she hoped to return to Somme Park within a few days. In fact, she was due to return to Somme Park on Thursday but her journey there wasn't as easy as she might have imagined or wished.

It began with a visit to A&E and then to Ward 44 of Altnagelvin Hospital where I visited her on Thursday evening. It was my privilege to spend some time with her and her family and then, before leaving, to pray with her and to commend her into the strong and loving arms of her heavenly Father. The medical prognosis indicated that Lily was seriously ill and, indeed, within an hour and a half of my departure from the hospital she made another journey—a journey from this time and place to eternity.

It has been a sad and emotional time for Lily's family, especially for Judith and Mark, and we are joining with them today to support them and all of Lily's relatives and to remember Lily with affection and thankfulness. The apostle Paul wrote in his Letter to the Philippians 'I thank my God every time I remember you' and I believe that we can echo those words today as we remember and pay tribute to Lily.

The story of Lily's life takes us back almost 89 years.

The daughter of Samuel and Isabella Thompson of Lisdillon, Ardmore, near Drumahoe, she was born on 30th December 1930. She was the second eldest of six children, her siblings being Joe, Jean, Margaret, Ria and John.

Her early church connection was as a member of The Reformed Presbyterian Church at Faughanbridge, Drumahoe. In those early days attendance at Sunday School and Church was 'a must' and Lily and her brothers and sisters would walk the 12 mile round trip every Sunday (or as Lily might say 'every Sabbath'). Their eyes would light up if they saw the Buchanan family coming along, because the Buchanans had a pony and trap and the Fielding children would be offered a lift, that was always appreciated.

When Lily finished her primary education, like many girls aged 14 years she was sent out to work. Lily's first place of employment was in the Maypole in Ferryquay Street. She, later, moved to Bond and Pollock wool shop in Butcher Street, working there with a Miss Dick, and eventually taking on the lease of the shop. During the years of 'The Troubles' Lily worked in McCutcheon's Shoe Shop where she formed a lasting friendship with the owners, Cecil and Vi Cunningham. They became more than good friends, they were more like members of the family, spending time at Millbrook Park at Christmas and Easter.

When Cecil and Vi retired from their business Lily found employment in the café at the Court House in Bishop Street. She became friendly with many of the RUC officers and made sure that they were given lovely scones and coffee.

Lily's family recalls that Lily was a wonderful cook and spending time in the kitchen was never a chore. Some of you may even remember Lily's mouthwatering pavlovas and pear puddings! Lily was a very active lady at work and at home but she also found time to be involved with the Saint John Ambulance that she attended with her cousin Nan McLaughlin. She also found time to play badminton and to dance – with a generous amount of expertise. 70 years ago, Lily met Arthur William Fielding, a member of this Parish of Templemore. They married in the Reformed Presbyterian Church at Faughanbridge, Drumahoe on 20th October 1949. Theirs was a marriage that was blessed with three children – Peter, Judith and Mark. The family lived at Gulf Road, Killaloo for some years before moving to 10 Millbrook Park, Altnagelvin.

Lily's and Arthur's marriage was marked by a strong commitment to each other and during their married life they were to each other 'a strength in need, a comfort in sorrow and a companion in joy'. Lily was a faithful wife ensuring that when Arthur was going to a meeting of the Masonic Lodge he 'looked like a new pin' and that there was a clean cotton handkerchief in his pocket. Lily would not go to bed until Arthur had returned and then she would ask him about the meeting. She knew so much about his activities that, at times, the family thought that Lily was a member of the inner circle!

Lily was not only a faithful wife – she, also, was a devoted mother who ensured that her children were well cared for and loved and, perhaps, today Judith and Mark can identify with the words of Proverbs, chapter 31 in which the writer extols the virtues of the capable wife and mother.

Arthur and Lily had a wide circle of friends and they, often, entertained their friends at the old Northern Counties Club – now Bishop's Gate Hotel.

Family holidays caravanning around Ireland and Scotland, with the occasional weekend visits to Clonmany in County Donegal, are also remembered fondly.

Lily was a person who enjoyed watching television. Quizzes, current affairs and politics were some of her favourite programmes and she was able to converse about many of the political turmoils at Stormont and Westminster.

Lily's husband Arthur died on Monday 15th May 2017. She missed him greatly and a short time after his death she decided to move to live in sheltered accommodation at Somme Park. Arthur's and Lily's son Peter died on 7th October 2014 in Melbourne, Australia where he was serving in the Police. His death and that of Arthur, to whom she had been married for 67 years, had an effect on Lily. She suffered much ill-health over the past 2 ½ years, and Judith and Mark would wish to record their gratitude to all who have cared for Lily during this time. In more recent days they wish to thank the staff at Ward 44 (the Coronory Care Unit) at Altnagelvin Hospital, the staff at The Rectory Field Home where Lily received wonderful care and support, and the carers who have attended to Lily since July 2014. Without this care and support Lily would not have been able to have lived such a long and fulfilling life.

It has been my privilege to have known Lily and to have ministered to her for almost 3 years. Canon John Merrick has known her for much longer. Both of us would wish to express our sympathy to you Judith, to Mark and Phyllis, and to your families – to Lily's grandchildren and great grandchildren – and to her siblings Ria and John.

Our time of ministry to Lily, whether at home or in nursing home or in hospital, has always been a fulfilling and rewarding experience. We were always welcomed graciously; our words were listened to attentively; and our readings and prayers were received with respect and appreciation.

Our memories of Lily are ones of deep affection and thankfulness.

I began this address by mentioning that Lily was looking forward to returning to Somme Park – to the place that she called **'home'**. But she did not get the opportunity to return to her home. Instead, she was taken to another home – a heavenly home that Jesus had prepared for her.

I'm certain that Lily would have read the words of Saint John, chapter 14, many times in her life. She may have wondered about this place – what it would be like and who would be there. We have only the words of Scripture to tell us about this place. Saint John in the last book of the Bible describes it as a place where pain, suffering, death and tears do not exist. It is a place filled with people of all nationalties. It is a place in which it is a pleasure to belong. We can only read about this place and think about it. Lily Fielding knows the reality of this place. She **'belongs'** to this new community in which she is re-united with her parents, siblings, husband and son.

Lily's home will be our home some day; on a day and at a time of God's choosing. Until that day comes when God will call us 'home' let us live as His faithful children, trusting in His love and mercy and in the assurance of His gift of eternal life.
